### Selection of District Governor 2019-2020

We are beginning the search for the Rotarian who will be our District Governor for the Rotary Year 2019-2020. This process ends with the announcement of the new District Governor Nominee Designate (DGND) at the 2016 District Conference.

Rotary International requires that the person nominated will follow a two-year process of training and preparation before assuming the role of District Governor. During the 2017-2018 Rotary year, the selected individual will be the District Governor Nominee (DGN). This role includes observation and training, and participation at District events. It also includes participation at the Rotary Zone 30-31 training institute in Springfield, IL September 5-7, 2017, the All-Ohio Presidents-Elect Training Seminar in March 2018, and participating as a non-voting member of key district committees.

During the 2018-2019 Rotary year, the selected individual will be the District Governor-Elect (DGE). The official election will take place at the 2017 District Conference. Training and observation activities continue, including participation at the Zone training institute in September or October 2017, and at the Rotary International Assembly (an assembly and training program for District Governors- Elect from all 537 Rotary Districts in the world) in San Diego in January 2019. The DGE will also be the lead District participant for the All-Ohio Presidents-Elect Training Seminar in March 2019.

The elected individual will become District Governor on July 1, 2019.

Our district utilizes a Nominating Committee process. Interested applicants must submit their completed application to Past District Governor Bill Shula, Chair of the Nominating Committee, prior to January 10, 2017. The Chair must review the application to ensure that the required elements are included and that the applicant meets all of the requirements set forth by RI and our DistrictInterviews of selected applicants by the committee will take place on Wednesday January 25, 2017 at Wetherington Country Club after 5pm.

Your help in identifying those qualified applicants would be appreciated. Please look within your club and within your Rotary network to identify those Rotarians who met the qualifications and have the desire to get involved at the District level. Feel free to approach he or she or contact Bill Shula, PDG, your Assistant Governor or any other member of the District Nominating Committee and he or she will be glad to reach out and answer all of their questions. The work that we do today will reap benefits for our District, Clubs and Rotarians in the future. Thank you in advance for your assistance.





# Piqua Rotary "Home for the Holiday" Fundraiser Raises in Excess of \$70K

The "Home for a Holiday" fundraiser sponsored by the Piqua Rotary Club on Dec. 1 kicked off earlier that day when an Edison State Community College student enroute to class stopped to inquire why AVI Chef Don Walters was constructing a brick house centerpiece for the reception that evening in the college's atrium. Walters replied it was the cornerstone for an event dedicated to raise money and build homes for Haitians displaced by the 2010 earthquake.

From the time the student handed Walters a \$5 bill to the end of the gala when a benevolent couple offered to purchase four homes at a cost of \$6,400 each, the day was a welcomed Christmas gift for Rotarians who generated in excess of \$70,000 or the equivalent of 10 homes for the Haitians who've remained in tent cities the past six years. And, even better, monies collected are being matched by an anonymous donor doubling the number of homes to be built in 2017.

Rotary's World Service Chair Sharon Semanie suggests the successful event, which was held in partnership with the international relief organization Food for the Poor, was "nothing short of a miracle" adding monies continue to arrive on a daily basis. An

updated report is expected soon.

"Nearly one and one-half years ago I was challenged by Ben Scott Sr. of Piqua to raise \$6,400 within the Piqua community to build a home in Haiti," began Semanie, who at the time had written a story in the Piqua Daily Call about Ben and Louise Scott's efforts to redevelop Haiti together with neighbors in Boca Grande, FL. Within the past six years the group has worked tirelessly with Food for the Poor to provide over 227 homes, community centers, clinics and farm animals for Haitians described as the "poorest of the poor".

Semanie turned to the Piqua Rotary Club whose motto "Service Above Self" and initiatives parallel with the needs of the Haitians. Together with a committee comprised of President Diana Davis, Kazy Hinds, Paul Gutmann, Melissa Leingang, Cheryl-Stiefel Francis, Scott Miller, Chuck Black, and Dr. Nancy Luce, Semanie and the World Service group focused their efforts on identifying sponsors and selling tickets for the Dec. 1 which attracted over 100 guests. Special guests included District Governor Mike Kelly and his wife, Melinda.

After enjoying Caribbean-inspired appetizers prepared by Walters and listening to a steel drum performance by Edison English Professor Brian Leingang, Rotarians and other attendees adjourned to the theatre where Scott emceed a program in tandem with Angel Alamo, executive director of Food for the Poor, who was as keynote speaker. Both provided an inspiring overview of Haiti's impoverished situation and a video taken there in September.

The evening culminated when Mark Murphy of Piqua auctioned a week-long stay on Block Island, R.I. donated by former Piqua native Terri (Snipes) Chmiel along with several membership packages to Anytime Fitness.

In addition to the fundraiser, students at Rotary-sponsored Interact Clubs at both Piqua High School and Lehman Catholic High School responded enthusiastically to a "Pennies for Haiti" campaign. They challenged classmates at both schools to donate whatever amount they could around the Thanksgiving holiday. PHS to date has turned over nearly \$750 with the winning fifth period class of Mrs. Kathy Hoying contributing \$97.12 and awarded a pizza party. The LCHS Interact members collected \$1,400 with the winning homeroom enjoying a breakfast prepared by Adviser Leah Bertke.

"We're overjoyed with the response to this fundraiser," noted Semanie, who attributes much of its success to generous sponsors and a healthy dose of "divine intervention". "Many individuals have asked how they can respond even though they were unable to attend. The Piqua Rotary Club has prepared cards for individuals who want to provide a gift in honor/memory of a loved one. When asked his response to the Rotary event, Scott replied "I am in awe of what has happened since the Piqua Rotary Club sponsored its fundraiser to raise money to build homes in Haiti. The generosity of so many people exploded, collecting to date over \$70,00, far exceeded my expectations. At the event I showed a video depicting the conditions in which the Haitian people are living and it is most horrific. No one should have to live like this. It must have touched many hearts because people responded generously. I want to thank all those kind and generous people who have given to this project and encourage others to consider helping. The money we have raised so far will build 10 homes for the Haitian people and for this they will be forever grateful. You cannot believe what a difference a home makes to a Haitian family."

President Diana Davis added "I am pleased that Piqua Rotary was able to team up with Ben Scott Sr. for this worthy cause. Rotary is an international organization committed to service, our local community and the world. We are a strong organization because, as members, we pool our resources and use our talents to serve our communities. These ideas are best expressed in our motto "Service Above Self". I am proud of our local club for its support in this Haitian project to help the citizens of this proud country to rise above the devastation of the many hurricanes which have ripped through one of the most hurricane-prone countries in the world. We are local Rotarians serving humanity and building homes in Haiti one block at a time."

Rotarian Dr. Michael Pope will host the official kickoff at the Troy Country Club, 1830 Peters Road, at 10:30 AM. Representatives from the Troy and West Milton Rotary clubs, the Miami County Sherriff's Office, and the Ohio Highway Patrol will be there to help support the launch. The gold and blue "Designated Driver" buttons will be distributed to area bars, restaurants, banks and drive-thru businesses during the holiday season. The State Liquor store will hand out 1,000 to customers while thousands more will be available in Troy, Tipp City and West Milton establishments.

According to area law enforcement, there have not been any alcohol-related fatal accidents during the holiday season in Miami County in the past 15 years. It's due, in part, to programs such as this Rotary campaign. The buttons are a visual reminder of the need to have a sober, designated driver instead of getting behind the wheel of a car after consuming alcohol at parties or celebrations. The button program is Pope's brainchild. "It has been a privilege for Rotary clubs to help our friends in Miami County have a safe holiday season through this campaign," he noted.

Justice Kennedy Speaks to Mason-Deerfield Rotary about Veterans Issues The Rotary Club of Mason/Deerfield Township recently welcomed Ohio Supreme Court Justice Sharon Kennedy who spoke about the Ohio justice system and the growing number of specialty Veterans Treatment Courts.

Kennedy said that, according to a U.S. Department of Justice Bureau of Labor Statistics report, in 2004 there were approximately 200,000 veterans in prisons and jails, representing about 10% of the total U.S. inmate population. Kennedy also noted reports showing that an estimated 1.5 million members of the U.S. Armed Services will have served in combat theaters of Iraq and Afghanistan, many with up to 3 or 4 deployments each. Up to 300,000 of those men and women find themselves returning home with Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI), Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD), or major depression.

Kennedy stated that combat trauma can make it difficult for service members to readjust to civilian life, and many find themselves in the justice system as a result. "Service members and their families who have given so much deserve our help. We have an obligation to help make them whole by connecting them to services available to them," said Kennedy.

As a result there has been a growing recognition within the justice system of the need for special Veterans Courts programs. As of 2014 there are 220 Veterans Courts nationwide, and 15 in Ohio as of 2016.

Kennedy said that Veterans Courts put together a collaborative interdisciplinary team including the prosecutor, defense counsel, treatment provider, probation department, and Veterans Health and Benefit Administrations. "Treatment courts fundamentally understand that veterans are struggling with issues of substance abuse in self-medicating PTSD, TBI, and sexual trauma. [There is an] assessment process to establish a wrap-around treatment plan for the individual," she said.

In addition Justice Kennedy spoke about two resources available to those with prior military service: the Ohio Military/Veterans Legal Assistance Project, which provides legal assistance to Ohio's veterans and service members; and the Veterans Justice Program, a division of the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs in which Veterans Justice Outreach specialists work to connect justice involved veterans and service members to benefits and treatment. ## Troy Rotary Foundation Supports Science Day in the Schools

Troy students are excited about STEM—science, technology, engineering and

mathematics—programs. Already this year, more than three dozen students from the school system have signed up to participate in the February 9, 2017, Miami County Science Day fair at Tippecanoe High School. Troy Rotary Foundation has provided a grant to help support the countywide event.

The program allows students to learn how to conduct independent research and engineering skills before they attend college or trade schools. They



started doing research in October and will provide a poster presentation of their work at the February event. What began in 2005 as a Science Day program in Tipp City as grown to include students from seven Miami County schools. In 2015, the event hosted more than 120 students in grades 5-12, and 49 projects won superior awards. Those who achieved such honors were invited to participate in the District Number 1 Science Day at Edison State Community College where they competed with 19 different schools in Champaign, Darke, Miami and Shelby counties. ### Dayton Rotary Nigeria Project Nearly Complete in Partnership with Nigeria Club, District 6670 & RI Grants and Clubs in District 6670

Dayton Rotary, with financial support of other District 6670 organizations, has undertaken a project in Abia State in Southeast Nigeria and has received both a Rotary International Global Grant and District Funds. Dayton Rotary is partnered with the Rotary Club of Eziukwu-Aba for this project. The total value of the project is \$55,350 with \$21,780 coming from RI and \$10,000 from District 6670. The remainder comes from Dayton Rotary and the generosity of the Rotary Clubs of Kettering, Moraine, Northmont, Cincinnati, and Springboro and the Interact clubs of Centerville, Springboro and the combined efforts of the Interact clubs of Bellfontaine, Benjamin Logan and Riverside. The project has four major elements: providing clean and safe water via a solar powered borehole; providing sanitation with flush toilets replacing an open pit latrine; making a community clinic operational with medical equipment, medicines, and a source of clean safe water; and introducing an effective science curriculum (Biology, Chemistry and Physics) to the Nvosi School. We will also be forming an Interact Club at Nvosi High School

While we take handwashing as a normal activity, when water is a scarce resource this is not the case. The combination of water sourcing, the sanitary facilities and the

 one of their responsibilities will be providing training in the "WASH in Schools" program supported by Rotary's WASRAG and the UN. operational clinic is expected to have a major impact on the overall health of the commiunity of about 1000 people. The change in this community reaches into areas that most Americans don't even think about in addition to the adding of handwashing as a routine activity: reduction in attacks and rapes as women and girls no longer have to go over a kilometer for water from a stream and better school attendance by adolescent girls who routinely miss up to a week per month due to lack of sanitary facilities at the school. Kettering Rotary adopted the borehole, Centerville Interact adopted the solar power system that runs the pump, Moraine Rotary adopted the Water storage tank and plumbing, Northmont Rotary adopted the entire clinic portion of the project, Cincinnati Rotary adopted the new septic system, Springboro Rotary and Interact adopted the Biology Program, while the combined Logan County clubs adopted the Physics Program. Dayton Rotary adopted all other aspects including the toilet block, washrooms, and Chemistry Program at the School. Those adoptions will be recognized with plaques at the specific sites within the project. Below is a signture in the borehole tower.

We anticipate the project will be complete before Spring. The borehole is fully operational as is the clinic where the Eziukwi-Aba Rotary Club recently held a heatlth fair for the entire community. The books and lab equipment have been delivered and the toilet block is nearing completion.
