We have just entered the year that is the 100th Anniversary of the Rotary International Foundation. The celebration of this event will be at the Rotary International Convention in June, 2017 in Atlanta.

The District Rotary Foundation Committee has already met and we are anxious to get the word out.

At the 1917 convention, Arch C. Klumph, the outgoing President of RI, proposed an endowment "for the purpose of doing good in the world." This endowment was renamed in 1928, The Rotary Foundation, at which time it became a distinct entity within Rotary International.

Arch Klumph began the Foundation with a contribution of \$26.50. RI is asking each Rotarian to donate at least \$26.50 to the Rotary Foundation this year. If

you regularly contribute more please continue your normal level of giving. If RI has not been on your list for donations this would be a great time to start with \$26.50 or more.

The RI Foundation has done many good things with its financial resources. Based on independent analyses of Foundations, RI administers its programs and its distribution of your donations very responsibly. You can be confident that this record of being a good shepherd of its assets will continue. Those assets come from you.

Recreation Department Reach Program. The youth receive tutoring, mentoring and recreational activities.


Cincinnati Rotary to Host the Wage Cincy Peace Summit

- By the Numbers 2015-2016
- --13 percent increase in students served through Grants to Teachers
- --18 percent increase in children served through Summer Camp Financial Aid
- --4 percent increase in athletes served through Dream Soccer
- --9 percent increase in children served at the historic, Children with Disabilities Christmas Party
- --10 percent increase in Special Olympic golfers at the annual Golf Outing
- --Number of therapeutic riders remained the same in our adoption of "Honey Pepper."
- --New reporting is Number of Cheerleaders with disabilities served through Cheer for a Cause

and placing in the district meet twice on relay events. She participated on non-school club soccer teams where she was a captain and was recognized as the Assert Builder District Recipient. Cincinnati Eastside Rotary Supports Community Garden

Rotary's early risers keeping the weeds down

In spring of 2010, faculty and staff who were planning Earth Day at the University of Cincinnati (UC) - Clermont College located in Batavia, OH, decided to pilot a small community garden to help serve those in need. The inaugural 25' x 25' space yielded 381 pounds of produce which was donated to area nonprofits who managed distribution.

The community garden has grown by a factor of nearly ten from these humble beginnings. In 2014, volunteers from the Cincinnati Eastside Rotary spear-headed an effort to erect a storage shed near the garden to store

essential tools for the garden upkeep.

This summer, volunteers from Cincinnati Eastside Rotary are joining other community volunteers to assist with watering, weeding and harvesting. Rotary is working in teams to provide this essential upkeep of the community garden.

Troy Rotarians Host the Cakery



It's part chemistry and part art. That's the secret to baking, decorating and enjoying beautiful cakes from The Cakery according to owner, Tom Kennedy. Troy Rotarians hosted Kennedy, and cake decorator, Megan Snyder, at the club's weekly meeting on July 12h.

Located at 1875 West Main Street in Troy, the store opened its doors in 2013 as the first expansion of the business that has been a feature in Dayton for more than 20 years. The cakes offered are made from a mix that is assembled and baked on site. The key step is to freeze the cake after it's baked to help it retain moisture content better. Cakes are baked up to three days in advance of delivery to an event or sale in the

store. The Cakery's butter cream icing is well-known and loved in the area for being creamy but not as sweet as other bakeries offer.

Snyder is one of Kennedy's decorators in the Troy location. She is an artist by training and self-taught with icing and decorating bags. She showed Rotarians how to do several types of flowers, edging and writing on a sample cake, resulting in a beautiful finished product. Her topnotch skills are the result of time, talent and patience to learn how to make the decorations look so good.
