
Heart of America Rotary Leadership Institute

Bellefontaine Rotary Recognized for Sponsoring Distracted Driving Simulator

Bellefontaine High School students received a powerful message recently. 10TV Sports Anchor Dom Tiberi shared his personal tragedy. On September 17th, 2013, Tiberi's 21-year-old daughter, Maria, was killed in a distracted driving crash on I-270 just three miles from their house. Dom explained the pain of losing a child. He urged every BHS student to make wise decisions while driving. Tiberi vividly remembers the night his daughter was killed. She was texting and driving when she rear-ended a semi at 10:38 p.m. Dom said seven police officers and a chaplain arrived at his house the following morning at 2:27. He said parents aren't supposed to bury their children. Tiberi reported that someone dies in a crash in Ohio every seven hours. There is an injury accident in Ohio every 4.8 minutes. Fatal accidents are up 9 percent compared to last year in our state. The leading killer for 8-24 year-olds are car crashes. 16 to 19 year-olds are three times more likely than any age group to be killed in a crash. Eleven percent of all drivers under the age of 20 involved in fatal crashes were distracted at the time of the crash. Tiberi started sharing his message to high school students 2 1/2 years ago. Bellefontaine is the 67th high school to host him. He has reached about 65,000 teens across Ohio. Bellefontaine Police Officer Andy Loehr spoke before Tiberi. He described a distracted driver fatality on State Route 540 near Route 33 in May.

The assembly concluded with students taking Maria's Pledge. The pledge states: I pledge to keep my hands on the wheel, keep my eyes on the road, keep my mind on my driving.

If I keep my hands, eyes, and mind where they should be, I can keep myself safe and keep Maria's Message alive.
