The Rotary Foundation of Cincinnati Acquires Additional Property for Camp Allyn!

At the February 18, 2021 weekly meeting of the Rotary Club of Cincinnati, Carl Kappes, the President of our Foundation, announced to Club members the acquisition of fifty-five acres of property adjacent to Camp Allyn. This purchase was the culmination of a process that began two years ago when the need was seen to protect our Camp Allyn from being compromised by new development surrounding our current property. An opportunity presented itself for us to buy an adjacent piece of land as a buffer between Camp Allyn and a future subdivision development.

Not only does this fifty-five acre property act as a buffer, but it also adds a beautiful, tree-lined meadow with Shaylor Creek meandering through it, more wooded area, two houses, several small storage buildings and a small barn. This property will give Stepping Stones/Camp Allyn the opportunity to expand the recreation, leisure, camping and respite activities that it currently provides so well for

Foundation President Carl gave thanks to all of the trustees, past Foundation Presidents Susan Wilkinson & John Fahrmeier and other people who worked to make this acquisition such a success. He also mentioned Fred Fischer, Al Koncius, Tim Hershner and Linda Muth for the key roles they played, as well as giving a special thanks to Richard

LaJeunesse for the huge amount of time and effort he gave to provide legal help and advice.

The timing is serendipitous in that this additional property increases Camp Allyn size to a total of 100 acres of land in its 100th Anniversary year! This property can be used to enhance the Camp Allyn experience for the enjoyment of campers and families, and will enable further transformation and progress for this wonderful Camp. Stay tuned for news about a 100th Anniversary celebration at the Camp.
