### THIS WEEK'S MEETING

Dr. C. Weldon Mathews – Role Ham Radio Plays in an Emergency

Weldon earned his B.S. in Chemistry from the University of Alabama and his Ph. D. in Physical Chemistry from Vanderbilt University. He did postdoctoral work for one year at Vanderbilt, followed by two years at the National Research Council in Ottawa, Canada. He then joined the faculty in the Department of Chemistry at The Ohio State University in Columbus in 1967.

As a faculty member, he was involved with teaching, research, and administration. His laboratory research program in high resolution molecular spectroscopy provided significant experience for 16 B.S. students, 9 M.S. students, and 13 Ph. D. students. He also served as Vice Chair for Graduate Studies and later as Vice Chair for Undergraduate Studies for the Department. He retired from OSU in June, 2000, but continues as Emeritus Faculty, which has involved some teaching, research, and administrative projects. He was a Visiting Professor at Amherst College, Amherst MA, 2003-4. Weldon and his wife Mary Beth moved from Columbus to Licking County in December, 2006. His hobbies include woodworking, photography, and Amateur Radio (Ham Radio). The latter also includes activities with the Amateur Radio Emergency Services (ARES). He served as Emergency Coordinator for ARES in Licking County 2010-15. His radio station (ham shack) is located in our basement and is equipped to handle all allowed frequencies from 1.8 -450 MHz. The biggest part of the equipment is a 70-foot tower and antennas located outside the house.

## PROGRAM

**Jerry Besanceney** introduced Mark Stanifer with Dare2Live Coaching to speak about active listening.

Mark Stanifer started out by asking Rotarians if they think their listening skills were above average. Many of them did. He continued to say that the majority of the time, people don’t pay attention or hear other peoples words but rather think, “What’s in it for me?”

Stanifer stated that, “Good listening can change the world.” He brought up a slide showing the sender, message and receiver. He stated that we spend a lot of time in the sender role and the message space, but how much time do we spend as a receiver?

He went into detail about the different listening levels.

*Surface* – Meeting people you never met. Interested in facts, details and information. Stanifer stated it’s ok to be at this level but don’t stay there.

*Understanding* – Deeper, more active listening. Perspective shifts from “what’s in it for me” to “who are you?” This is where you listen to understand the perspective of the other person while withholding out own judgment. How do I get to know you? How can I learn from you?

*Intuition* – Deep, meaningful conversation for hours and hours.

Stanifer then went into details about why we listen:

*Leadership* – We are all leaders, even if it’s just leading yourself. Critically important as leaders to listen.

*Influence* – Think of what you want and relating to people in a way that allows you to be more influential. “If you don’t listen, you won’t influence.”

*Serve* – We serve people all the time. You give to get. Listening is a way to do this. Communicates to the other person that they are of value, you establish a relationship and that grows from there.

*Trust* – If you don’t listen, they won’t trust you.

*Engage* – Eye contact and body language communicate you’re listening. How do you engage? You have to interact to be active.

*Necessity* – We choose not to listen and to be distracted. We need to be others-focused instead of self-focused.

He asked the question, “What is one thing you will do to improve your listening?” and had people write it down.

There was a question about how active listening applies to electronic communication. Stanifer mentioned the 24-hour rule. When you’re fired up or upset about something, wait 24 hours to respond. As we go more digital, the advantage of listening becomes more critical. We can listen, we can ask – “what” or “how” for open ended questions and listen to people’s response.
