PROGRAM

Steve Layman introduced **Dan DeLawder** and shared Dan's successes at PNB and his elder statesman status. **Steve** shared the various studies about Downtown Newark as well as the successful revitalization project that was led by Newark Development Partners.

Dan began by sharing "expectation management", which is to work toward a common goal or goals combined with collaboration. He highlighted a variety of buildings in Downtown Newark and reiterated the beauty of Downtown Newark is key for the success of our community.

Dan recognized other leaders in **Jerry McClain** and his vision to create a beautiful first impression as people enter downtown, **Marcia Downs** for The Works and Sci Dome, Sarah Wallace and her father Gib, with his vision for the Canal Market District as well as Sarah's vision for the Boys and Girls Club in the old Maholm building and **Steve Layman** for creating apartments (Old School Apartment Living) in the former West Main school building.

Dan spoke about the Alford Building, Park 22 (across from the Alford Building), North Third Tower, the potential development of the Little Bear, along with the renovations/lighting of our courthouse.

Dan's philosophies of "When we commit to it, we do it" and "You don't get a second chance to make a first impression" emanated throughout his presentation. He shared a colorful picture that captured the city of Newark and the courthouse and highlighted Foundation Park as well as a vintage picture of North Park Place. He talked about the newer businesses downtown (Nework, 31 West, Denison University, Moe's BBQ and the Crystal Ballroom) which help us stand tall when people come from out of town. All new business, restaurants, and apartment living are a wonderful addition to our area.

Dan highlighted the three pillars of our community – The Works, (50,000 visitors) Midland Theatre, and the Licking County Library. **Dan** spoke of the leadership of Fred Ernest and the Newark Development Partners along with the renovations to White Field with the support of the Evans Foundation with regard to the new monument which was dedicated in the fall. We have a new Fire Station 1 and new Newark Police Station. We are creating an environment that didn't exist ten years ago along with the key to success being collaboration and clear vision.
