PROGRAM

Rick Platt introduced Stephanie Zwerner who is president of May We Help Columbus, a local non-profit that creates custom adaptive devices for those with disabilities. He referenced Rotary's Strategic Plan and Rotary Park and the focus on helping those with special needs.

Stephanie gave a history of the organization which started in early 2000 and is headquartered in Cincinnati. The Columbus Chapter was organized about five years ago and is the only chapter at this time. Three friends, all named Bill, started the non-profit, entirely run by volunteers to create unique products that aide the disabled in such areas as sports, music and art. These volunteers include engineers, architects and handy men.

All solutions are provided free of charge and are funded through sponsorships and grants. All of the devices are custom made and not commercially available.

She shared several slides of examples which included a go-cart, a one arm/one leg bicycle, a camera mount for a wheelchair, a custom cello stand, a fishing rig for a wheelchair, and a respiratory cart for a child with underdeveloped lungs. She said these devices give the user more independence and confidence. Customers often come back with additional requests so that they can do more on their own. One particular success story was related to the child with the respiratory cart. The cart enabled him to move so freely about that he gained enough strength in his lungs that he no longer needs the respirator. A sensory chair has been developed for classroom use that rocks and provides a sound dampened, dark, warm and safe environment that serves those with sensory overload. The organization has sent 25 of these chairs all over the United States and one to India.

The Columbus Chapter works closely with the Ohio State University and Nationwide Children's Hospital as well as the Department of Development Disabilities. Rotarians can help by sharing this information with others and helping connect them to those in need, serving as a volunteer or considering one of their two open board member's slots. The board meets in downtown Columbus.
