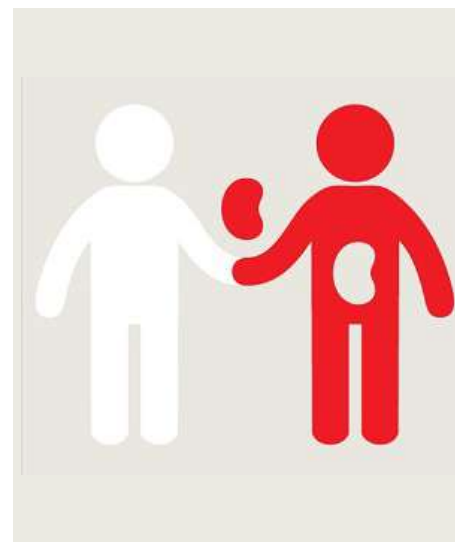

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## PROGRAM

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**Pattye Whisman** introduced Laura Neese, sharing her interest in racing with dogs began at the age of 9 when she learned about it through her home school program. At the age of 14 she started with 30-mile races in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan. She graduated from high school at the age of 16 and moved to a Vet Tech program to support her passion for this sport and graduated in 2015. She has completed 3 1000-mile races, the Iditarod and the Yukon Quest – very few women have completed these. On May 3 she received many honors from the Ohio State House and beyond for her success in the field.

Laura began by introducing the group to Maple, a 6 ½ year old Alaskan Husky, her number one competitive racing dog. Alaskan Huskies all look different, they are not bred for appearance – it is about performance. They must have a desire to run all the time, eat well to replenish calories and have a thick coat. They must be healthy, happy dogs, show passion for this life, wag tails, make good eye contact and have the desire to be running outdoors in extreme conditions. The coldest they have experienced is 60 below 0 with a 90 below windchill – she admitted these are crazy situations. Majority of teams are Alaskan Huskies. Siberian teams may be used. Not as fast, they save for reserve, they do have endurance/physically ready.

1000-mile races are her passion. Planning and training creates unbelievable bonds with the dog and musher so they can become a single unit. The result is joy and pride with incredible athletes. 100–200 miles a day are run for the 1000-mile races. Race variations impact plans.

Laura asked everyone to ask questions instead of her presenting a formal presentation.

Q: Have you run without snow? A: Yes, it can happen. Dogs like to run fast, mushers must hold them back- it makes it more challenging.

Q: How do judges/marshals participate? A: Every race has a marshal at every check-point. It is a unique sport. There is competition certainly, but also remarkable care for one another while out on the course. If there is an issue you would want the favor returned. 200–300 miles alone during race.

Q-How do you prepare? A: One month before the race, drop bags are packed- weighing food, freezing meat, getting supplies like gloves, chemical warmers, fire starters- all needs. This is shipped to the starting point then it is sent out by the race. Food for Iditarod: 310 lb. kibble, 360 lbs. beef, 300 lbs. of fat. More than needed.

Q- How do you fundraise? A: There are 200 dogs in Michigan at camp. 20 race/work, the rest of the dogs staff the camp for touring business to fund the races. Brochures on table. Sponsorship key as well. There are cash prizes but not enough to cover costs. Sponsors Royal Canin provides all food. People will pick specific dogs to sponsor.
