DG BRENT'S BRIEFS

It's Not Just About Numbers

When I assumed the role of District Governor last July 1, my number 1 goal was to revitalize, strengthen and grow our clubs. Most notably I wanted to encourage our clubs to feel free to change and even take risks – adopt new projects, abandon projects or programs that were no longer popular with the club, look at alternative meeting times and days, add

social and networking events, and other changes. The goal was not change for change sake, but to help Rotary and our clubs evolve, and become more relevant to the young professionals who will be the Rotarians of tomorrow. The simple fact is membership in our District, like all Rotary in the US, had been shrinking. This wasn't because we weren't bringing in new members – we were inducting as many new members as before - but because we weren't retaining the members we had. Simply stated, our clubs were not giving members what they wanted out of their Rotary experience, so they quit.

We started the Our Members Are Our Customers program – a "members first" approach to club operation that emphasizes whole club excellence and (hopefully) replaces the old Rotary way of "fit into our box." We emphasized the fact that the Rotary traditions are nice and we should be proud of them – but they should serve us, not vice versa. So if a tradition keeps us from bringing in good Rotarians or gets in the way of our mission, *change or eliminate it!* In short we have been asking clubs to take a top-to-bottom look at themselves and if necessary re-create the club into what the members want.

I am pleased to report that we have reversed the trend and are growing again for the first time in several years. Many of our clubs have not only grown significantly, but have experienced a great resurgence in service activity and enthusiasm. Many of our clubs have added monthly social meetings and networking events, tweaked their meeting schedules to accommodate members who may not be able to make the scheduled time, become more lenient on attendance and makeups (see the article "RI Board Votes to Eliminate Attendance Requirement"), and started granting leaves of absence instead of allowing members to leave for "business obligations." I, DGE Mike and DGN Bart both approve of and encourage these and other changes. Clubs that have tried these are experiencing growth and increased levels of service and activity.

We've just begun. DGE Mike will be building on what we have started this year and has asked me to serve as Membership Chair next year, which I will gladly do. We have a way to go to help our clubs shed the "oldthink" that holds us back, and start seeing the possibilities and growth that come with smart change. Each club is different and has its own culture. But every club can benefit from the Our Members Are Our Customers concepts. By the time you read this, the District Assembly will have passed and we will be preparing for District Conference (see my other article on that as well!) and the start of a new Rotary year. We will have sessions on Our Members Are Our Customers at District Conference as well as at the Membership Seminar which will be held next September 29. And I will be available to assist your clubs in this as well. Be sure to attend these events and call on us to assist your club.

The bottom line is this: The world we serve needs a strong and active Rotary. This effort isn't just about us. It's about being able to fulfill and grow our mission of Service Above Self to a world which desperately needs the help, hope, and opportunity only Rotary can provide!

FIELD OF HERDES

On Memorial Day Weekend, a spectacular visual display of 2,500 American Flags will be displayed across from the Westerville Community Center on Cleveland Avenue in Westerville. These 3' x 5' flags will stand 8 feet tall in perfect rows and columns across a field of green.

NO MORE ATTENDANCE REQUIREMENT?!

In January, the Board of Rotary International voted to amend the Manual of Procedure to totally eliminate the attendance requirement. This is <u>not</u> an immediate change, however, as the Council on Legislation, which meets next year, must approve such a change. The COL acts on its own and the Board's resolution is not binding on it. And the COL tends to be a rather conservative body, so many doubt it will approve the measure.

However, in my view, the handwriting is on the wall and it is inevitable that the attendance requirement will be history within a few years. To which I for one say, "it's about time." I agree with one of the speakers at the New Orleans RI International Convention who rightly asked, "Why should a supposed service organization be so obsessed with meeting attendance?" Good question indeed.

Now don't get me wrong. I believe meeting attendance is very important for clubs, and the health of a club is directly tied to its attendance and


membership growth numbers. If your club's attendance is poor it is for a variety of reasons: an uninviting atmosphere, boring programs, etc. that indicate a need for the club to evaluate itself and change. When I told a group of club presidents elect in Illinois about the Board's action, one asked how, without this "stick," they can keep members coming to meetings. I replied that if you need a "stick" the club is in a

world of hurt. If the only reason members come to the club is because of an attendance rule the club desperately needs to retool from top to bottom.

I don't believe our members should attend meetings because of a rule. I believe our members should attend because they are excited about the club's mission, because they want to be with their friends, and because they feel it's a great use of their breakfast or lunch (or even dinner) hour. Nobody joins Rotary to go some place to eat — they join to accomplish something or to have needs met. If those needs aren't met, they stop coming and eventually quit. Our clubs should attract both members and potential members, not use a club to beat them over the head to attend.

My current perfect attendance streak is 10 years, which pales in comparison to the 50+ year streaks many of our Rotarians have. I have been a Rotarian for 20 years. For the first several years my attendance, while within the rules, was far from perfect. My attendance picked up when I became active and engaged in the club. In other words, threats to hit someone over the head with a rule book don't work. What promotes attendance is an active and attractive club and members who feel a sense of ownership because of their involvement.

APRIL IS NATIONAL DONATE LIFE MONTH

Last year more than 28,000 men, women and children in the U.S. received a life-saving organ transplant and 1 million more received a healing tissue transplant. Their lives were saved or enhanced due to the generous nature of caring strangers. Unfortunately, more than 113,000 Americans need a life-saving organ transplant, while thousands await a healing tissue transplant.

April is National Donate Life Month, a perfect time for us to reflect on the difference we can make as registered organ, eye and tissue donors. One donor has the potential to save eight lives through organ donation and heal up to 50 more through tissue and eye donation. Organs that can be donated include heart, lungs, liver, kidneys, small intestine and pancreas. Tissues include heart valves, bones, tendons, ligaments, fascia, veins, skin, nerves and corneas.

Donor family member, Laci Thomas, knows how important registering to be an organ, eye and tissue donor can be:

On June 13, 2009, exactly 15 weeks before our wedding, my 22-year-old fiancé, Danny Thomas, was killed in a motorcycle accident. Danny and I were high school sweethearts. He was an amazing man, father and friend with a huge smile and a heart of gold. The previous October, we went to renew Danny's license and he told me he wasn't a registered organ and tissue donor. I told Danny, "That is THE most ignorant thing"

I have ever heard in my life! Do you think that if you are dead you need those organs?" Then I walked away and went to the car to wait for him to finish renewing his license. When Danny got in the car, he handed me his license. There it was, that tiny red heart and those 3 words that are so powerful: Ohio Organ Donor. I hugged him and his smile was too hard to hide. Eight months later, Danny was killed on his way home from work. He left behind a fiancé, our twoyear-old daughter, parents, a sister and so many more family members and friends. When I think of how much it hurts that he is gone the pain is almost unbearable, but then I think of the lives he improved because he was a tissue and eye donor. Although nothing can take the pain of the loss we have suffered, I try to remember that there is so much more than us and our loss, so many people out there who could be saved just by spreading the word about organ and tissue donation.

There is no greater gift than the "Gift of Life." By registering your donation decision, just like Danny did, you provide hope to the more than 3,400 Ohioans waiting on a life-saving organ transplant. Although the need is great, myths and misconceptions prevent many people from registering. Here is the truth about donation:

- Anyone of any age can register to donate organs and tissues.
- Even people with health conditions (diabetes, cancer, etc.) can still register their decision to donate. Medical professionals will determine what can be donated at the time of death.
- ◆ All major religions in the U.S. support organ and tissue donation.
- ◆ Your status as a donor will never compromise your medical care. Only after every effort to save a life has failed is donation considered. In fact, medical personnel and first responders do not have access to the Ohio Donor Registry.
- There is no cost to a donor's family or their estate for organ and tissue donation.

To register as an organ, eye and tissue donor, log onto www.lifelineofohio.org, say 'yes' at the Bureau of Motor Vehicles when asked if you want to be an organ, eye and tissue donor or fill out and mail in a donor registry enrollment form (available by

contacting Lifeline of Ohio).

Additionally, Lifeline of Ohio offers free educational presentations and materials promoting donation for professional, civic, church and social organizations, as well as elementary through college level school programs. These programs are offered year-round as a community service and are customized to meet the objectives of the particular audience. A Message to Clubs Implementing PR Programs Using an RI Grant

If your club has been accepted for a PR Grant for a program in your community, it is time to be wrapping up your activities. D6690 needs to have the following in order for us to secure reimbursement from RI:

- Proof of payment to all your vendors
- Proof of execution of the project (tear sheets, etc.)

You are responsible for implementing the PR project you proposed in your grant application by **May 15** and you are responsible for paying the vendor(s) upon completion. After you have paid all vendors, proof of payment and documentation of grant activities must be provided to the District so that we can submit to Rotary International for reimbursement.

All reimbursement requests and supporting documentation, including invoices, zero balance invoices and proof of the project must be submitted to District 6690 via email - with scanned invoices - by May 25.


THE RYLA COUNTDOWN IS ON!

• Facilitators – Group facilitators are needed to lead the student sessions through the established curriculum. Facilitators should enjoy working with young adults and have experience with group learning and facilitating group discussion. In order to maintain

• *Nurse* – This position will be needed Thursday morning through Saturday at noon. Nurse can be either active or retired. In addition, nurse will be on -call 24/7 for any and all medical needs.

Complimentary meals and overnight accommodations will be provided throughout the conference.
