DG BRENT'S BRIEFS

Service Above Self – it's a deceptively simple phrase, isn't it? Three little words that challenge us to act totally against the grain of human nature. "Service" we can all agree is a good thing. "Above self"? Whew that's a tough one. It asks us to actually subjugate our own comforts, desires and needs. Not easy.

I think about Service Above Self especially during November, Foundation Month. As the District Foundation chair for 6 years I encountered many generous people who gave way beyond what was comfortable for them because they know it funds all of Rotary's work and because they know the Foundation stewards their donations so well.

One Rotarian couple who regularly supports the Foundation beyond their comfort level is Rich and Barbara Dair of the Byesville Club. Rich is a disabled Vietnam War vet. Yet he and Barb give generously to the Foundation every year. When I visited the Byesville Club, Rich told me something I will never forget. After I thanked him for his Service Above Self, both to our country and Rotary, he told me, "Brent no matter how little you think you have there is always someone less fortunate who needs our help. We all have a duty to help those people." To Rich and Barb, giving is more than a duty, it's an honor and a joy, one I share with them. Rich's words and acts – inspire me daily.

We ask all Rotarians to support our Foundation every year, whether it's \$100 (less than \$2 per week) for the entire year to be a sustaining member or \$1000 ever year to be a Paul Harris Society member. But whatever members give, the important thing is to help our Foundation every year. The money that we in District 6690 have to spend for our clubs' projects depends on what our District's Rotarians give three years previously, so every year we start over. If you became a Paul Harris Fellow 5 or 10 years ago, thank you - but we need your support now!

So, why should you support our Foundation? Because

- 100% of the money you give goes to the work of Rotary. Not a penny is spent on administration or fundraising. No other charity can claim that!
- The money you give comes back to our District to fund your club's projects both at home and internationally.
- We determine right here in District 6690 how to spend the money we make the spending decisions, not RI.
- The need for Rotary's service grows greater all the time and the money is needed so we can expand our reach and impact both at home and around the world.
- You'll feel better for giving generously!

It's our Foundation. Please, please support it - support us - generously this year and every Rotary year. Thank you!



UPPER ARLINGTON ROTARY'S GUATEMALA MAYAN FAMILIES PROJECT

Upper Arlington (UA) Rotarians are not only doing great things for the local community but are also taking their Service Above Self commitment to help people less fortunate around the world.

In January 2011, the club committed to a major multi-year project helping impoverished children in a small mountainous village called Tierra Linda located outside Panajachel, Guatemala. In addition to having their small village almost destroyed by Tropical Storm Agatha in 2010, most of the families don't speak Spanish – only Kachiquel, a centuries old Mayan dialect which creates significant challenges. Also, most families struggle to provide even one daily meal for their children and struggle to send them to school. In January 2011, UA Rotary provided the means and support to open the first ever middle school in Tierra Linda, creating an opportunity for the children to continue their education past the sixth grade. UA Rotarians have made three trips to Tierra Linda since

November 2010 and the club has donated 27 used computers, desks and chairs, text books, security bars for windows, electricity hook ups, teaching materials, supplies and even helped cover the expense of adding a seventh grade teacher.

In May, the club constructed a much needed retaining wall for the school and community center to ensure safety from mud slides during rainy season. In July, the construction of a small kitchen was begun to expand the preschool nutritional feeding program ensuring that the most at risk children receive at least one nutritious meal a day - often their only meal. In August, the club approved the construction

allowing for additional classroom space and the expansion of the preschool. In September, the club agreed to open an 8th grade starting in January 2012. In addition to all the school supplies, desks, chairs, text books, etc., the club will also donate over 45 used laptop computers. Already the village is excited as 27 6th graders have signed up to attend the 7th grade, including 8 girls that normally would have stopped their education.

In early November, Rotarians made their 4th trip to Guatemala to ensure the project's success and investigate future projects focusing on sustainability. Sharon and Dwight Poage, founders of Mayan Families, recently made the trip from Guatemala to meet all the members of UA Rotary and express their thanks for the great things the club is doing. The club hosted them for 3 days in Columbus and Rotarians arranged meetings with OSU, several hospitals including Nationwide Children's Hospital, area high schools and Columbus based corporations to provide resources for the projects. It was a great success!

The UA Rotary Club recognizes that our support must encompass not only immediate help but provide a hand up to these people and create sustainable solutions to the dire situations facing these people every day. With so many issues still facing them, UA Rotary is committed to continue their support for Tierra Linda including addressing clean water, elderly feeding program, shelter, clothing, continued education, preschool feeding programs, homeless children, trade skills and medical support. - Steve Sandbo, President-Elect of UA Rotary

Our society has become the "me" generation. A people who only think of themselves. It seems that we want what is best for us. What others may want or need matters not.



3. Promoting peace and conflict resolution

Fellows are leaders in promoting national and international cooperation, peace, and conflict resolution. The efforts of Oussou and Rotary Peace Fellows advance the peace and conflict prevention/ resolution area of focus.

2. Basic education and literacy

A literacy project sponsored by Rotarians in South Africa and Rhode Island. in conjunction with the International Reading Association and Operation Upgrade, is teaching adults in the rural community of KwaNibela, South Africa, to read and write. These skills will help them fight poverty in their community. Through the effort, nearly 600 adults are attending literacy classes taught by instructors trained with help from Operation Upgrade, which specializes in adult basic education. Funding from The Rotary Foundation provided classroom books.

1. Eradicating polio

Around the world, Rotarians are going the distance participating in walkathons, climbing mountains, cycling, even circumnavigating a continent in rubber dinghies, among other fundraisers - to help Rotary rid the world of polio.

Since Rotary launched its Polio Plus program in 1985, eradicating the disease has become the organization's top priority. End Polio now has helped to fulfill Rotary's promise to the world.

5. Fighting hunger

In Romania, children have eggs, milk, and meat because of a Foundation grant that enables farmers to buy animal feed, packaging materials, and other supplies. The farmers agree to donate a portion of their goods to hospitals, schools, and orphanages. In Alaska, Anchorage East Rotary is also fighting hunger by distributing food to low-income families through a mobile food pantry. Projects such as these address two areas of focus: maternal and child health and economic and community development.

4. Reducing child mortality

The Rotary clubs of Jaela-Kandana, Sri Lanka, and Madras Northwest, India, are helping to reduce child mortality by providing improved sanitation facilities for 15 families in a village in Sri Lanka. With a Rotary Foundation Matching Grant, they have built 14 toilets, helping to prevent diarrhea-causing diseases related to poor sanitation. According to the World Health Organization, 1.8 million children die of diarrhea every year, making it the second leading cause of death among children under five. Proper sanitation can reduce the child mortality rate in many communities by more than 30 percent. Water and sanitation is one of the areas of focus.

DANCES OF INDIA

As part of its PolioPlus Campaign and in tribute to Past District Governor Ram Gawande, Columbus Rotary presented Dances of India. The group performing was Malanda School of Indian Dances. Dancers showcased various classical. folk and Bollywood style dance forms. Dance and music like many art forms unites people of all backgrounds to foster harmony and unity. These dancers of all ages have performed in and around central Ohio for many fundraisers over the last two decades. The enchanting beats of Indian and fusion music invoked the dancer in all of us! Congratulations to Columbus Rotary for raising over \$10,000 that evening!





THE SPOTLIGHT IS ON: PAST DISTRICT GOVERNOR MEL SIMON (Gallipolis)

PDG Mel served as our District Governor in 1998-99. That year, the RI President was James Lacy of **Cookesville, TN, and the RI theme was: "Follow Your Rotary Dream.**" There were 54 clubs in the district and Governor Mel held his district conference at the University of Rio Grande. He is most proud of "The **Operation We Care**" project to the Philippines that he made the centerpiece of his five goals and objectives that year. (Incidentally, with the ongoing support of 9 Districts, that project remains viable and continues to help hundreds of indigent patients each year not only by saving lives but improving the quality of life.) He says that his most embarrassing times that year were when certain PDGs would shout at him, "Stand up Mel!" He effectively deflected this by stating that he stands like a dime between two nickels. Like nearly every PDG I meet, he notes his most fond memories included the gaining of so many new friends as he and Lydia traveled around the District. "We met all fellow Rotarians as friends that up to this date remain to be true friends working together for a common purpose."










