



Speakers at this year's District Conference include:






Newark Rotary:

"Growing Members, Growing Likes, Growing Service Above Self for Newark" There must be something happening in Newark. The Newark Rotary Club is seeing growth these days in more ways than one. Since July, the club has added no less than 14 new members. The new members are much

> in-line with the traditional Rotary mix of professionals too. Manufacturing, engineering, education, tourism, mortuary, financial, and legal are a few of the latest new member classifications.

President Laura Lewis attributes the growth to a growing awareness of the Rotary Club efforts in the community and a growing interest in service. "Our club has chosen to take on a new service project every month to really demonstrate Service Above Self for Newark. The Rotary Club's presence in everything from donating coats to the needy to serving food at the local soup kitchen is making a difference."

> The Club's Facebook page is growing too. After a recent public image awareness campaign, the page boasts more "Likes" than any other in the District. The club led a "Did You Know?" ad campaign spotlighting the popular Rotary Accessible Playground project in Newark and the Rotary International "This Close" ad featuring Ohioan Jack Nicklaus. The one-week campaign brought a 24% increase in "Likes" to the page and realized over 150,000 ad impressions with targeted Facebook users. The cost to the Club was \$0 as a Rotarian in-kind donated the entirety of the costs that Facebook charged for the ads.




The Object of Rotary
