#### Help make Rotary better—your suggestions wanted

#### 2013 COL will meet April 21-26, in Chicago Council on Legislation (COL)

Does your club have a current copy of the 2010 Manual of Procedures? Do you know what it is and how it is changed?

The COL was established in 1934. Since 1974, the COL meets every 3 years to review and update the Manual. This year the COL will meet April 21-26 in Chicago to review and vote on 181 suggested changes or items. There are two types of items: 1) enactments are proposals to amend the constitutional documents of Rotary International; and 2) resolutions are items deal with policies and procedures and do not seed to amend the constitutional documents.

The 2013 COL began with 381 items submitted by Rotary Clubs from around the world. After due process, the number of items needing action is 181. Fifteen COL items were submitted by the RI Directors. One hundred Rotary Districts throughout the world including 20 Districts within the USA shared their suggestions for updating the Manual.

Subject matter to be covered by the COL includes attendance, meetings, e-clubs, District boundaries, travel, per capita dues, terms for District Governors, the Foundation and its programs, and the object of Rotary.

The Manual of Procedures is Rotary's guidelines for all facets of Rotary and should be available to your Board and its members. Please go to the Rotary International website (<u>www.rotary.org</u>), search for "2013 Council on Legislation items," and review the items to be covered. #### OPERATION WE CARE 2013 and Matching Grant #77839

**The Operation We Care** (OWC) of Rotary International District 6690 of 2013 is scheduled for another medical/Surgical/Dental Mission on February 10 -16, 2013. This marks the 29<sup>th</sup> year of mission to the Philippines visiting the three big Islands of the Republic over the years from 1985 to the present, namely: Luzon, Visayas and Mindanao.

All Presidents of the Philippines from President Marcos, Cory Aquino, Fidel V. Ramos, Joseph Estrada and Gloria Macapagal Arroyo, invited the members of the **Operation We Care** to the "White House" or "Malacanang Palace" to give recognition to the visiting team for its great Humanitarian Initiatives.

Such initiatives include not only surgical, medical and dental operations among the 300 plus indigent patients seen each year but also rendered services to construct deep water wells for safe drinking among villagers where none existed before, Nutrition and Feeding programs for the undernourished school children, and books for schools to supplement their literacy undertakings. Hence, the name Medical Mission to the Philippines was renamed "**Operation We Care**".

The venue of next month's mission will take place in **A**. Rodriguez Memorial Medical Center in Marikina, Metro Manila, Philippines, one place where population of indigent is at its highest, at about 40,000 in a 100,000 population. This will be the second time that the **OWC** was extended an invitation by the Mayor, the Marikina Rotary Club President, the Director of the Hospital and the District Governor of D3800 (Philippines).

The same individuals in addition to 14 local Rotary Clubs in the Philippines and the DDF of DG. Lirio Sandoval, District 3800 (Philippines) have committed and contributed for the Matching Grant No.77839 in partnership with District 6690 (U.S.) DDF in addition to Rotary Clubs of Gallipolis and Jackson forged with the Rotary Foundation to assure approval of Matching Grant No. 77839.

All the above participated in the formation of Matching Grant No 77839 partnership matched by TRF (The Rotary Foundation).

The funds derived from Matching Grant No. 77839, as in years past, make the **OWC** yearly project possible. Along with this, the efforts of all Rotarians, both in the U.S.A. and the Philippines in addition to some local government agencies assure the success as well as the implementation of the project in a transparent manner to bring it to its fruition. Thus closer international friendship, peace and understanding are fostered between two countries.

It is to be noted that this was the last Matching Grant applied and approved by the TRF in the old and former form because starting this year the new Format of Global Future Vision becomes effective in order for local Rotary Districts can have more leverage in all aspects of the project.

### Rafiki Update—February 2013

#### **Big changes at the Clinic**

The first notable change at the clinic is physical: the appearance of a second floor. Funding from a grant from the Diocese of Southern Ohio has allowed the beginning of construction of a second floor onto the clinic.

This additional space, although originally conceived as a maternity wing, will be initially purposed to provide much needed dental services for the community. We are working on securing the volunteer services of some local dentists to provide clinic time with equipment and supplies being provided by the clinic. This will be a wonderful additional benefit that Rafiki will provide.

Perhaps the biggest event of the annual celebration was related to Rafiki Academy which opened up early this year beginning the process of bringing education in-house. We began with pre-school and Classes 1 and 2. We have excellent teachers. The business plan calls for each class to be  $\sim$ 20-25 students. 1/3 would be our own and 2/3 would come from the community.

We have this goal because we don't want our kids isolated from the community. In addition, those community parents who currently are paying school fees to the local primary school would be paying them to us instead. With that income, the school would be a major profit center for Rafiki. We plan to add one class each year.

A school bus donated by Downtown Rotary Club and first Community Church has provided the necessary transportation to get sufficient students signed up so that over 100 students are now enrolled. The school is expanding and your support is greatly appreciated.

Clean, safe water is something we take for granted until we visit an area of the world where clean water is scarce.

Last year, during a trip to Africa, Dublin AM Rotarian Faye Herriott and her husband Dick were touched by the need for clean water for children attending the Englai Primary School in Englai, Africa. Faye worked with Dublin AM Rotary to raise funds from the club's International Services committee and from four other clubs in District 6690 to install a rainwater harvesting system: Whitehall/Bexley, Malta/Marietta, Grove City and Lancaster-Sherman. The work was completed by the Cheli & Peacock Community Trust. It was finished slightly under budget and just in time to capture the precious rainfall.Generations of children will benefit from the water project and several jobs were created to build and maintain the system.





The well is supposed to be drilled soon and will service fresh water for 3,500 people. The two clubs presented a \$10,000 check for the project and will oversee the project starting this January. No only does Rotary help their local community, but they have a concern for the underdeveloped countries that are not nearly as fortunate as we Americans.



The president of Daybreak Rotary, Dr. Paul Brown, posted this statement on our website, and I have found it to be quite inspiring. "Daybreak Rotary's goal is to improve the quality of life for all of our neighbors with both monetary help and active volunteerism". What I find intriguing with this quote is the part about "all of our neighbors". The *all* really proves to be accentuating for me because the quote could have easily been said with just, "for our neighbors". Instead it says, "for all of our neighbors". This shows Rotary's concern for everyone in the community, regardless of where they live or what lifestyle they follow.

Rotary International's 2012-2013 theme is "Peace Through Service". I couldn't agree more with this statement. Peace is obtained when people put in the time and effort to achieve peace. 
