- Ask RYLA alumni to serve as RYLA counselors, facilitators, or support staff.
- Plan a reunion for RYLA alumni.
- Help RYLA alumni get in touch with local Interact or Rotaract clubs.
- Develop a project aimed at reaching out to youth such as a career day or a mentoring program—e.g. first generation college students benefit when they have a mentor who knows how to survive the college experience.



The last thing we did was make a Personal Mission Statement, basically just a goal for us or a saying to live by, and the y laminated it for us and let us take it home.


The only other thing I would say is just to make friends! I met so many different people there, and I am still in touch with a few who live close by.

There is no feeling like being an exchange student! To go to another country to learn a new style of life and share your own culture with a different nation helps you achieve one of the greatest dreams of our world: to integrate nations for world peace. All nations need to understand that there is no better culture than another and our different cultures make the world a fun place to live.

We exchange students want something else besides just helping

the world: we want to improve our lives, to have a great time, to get to see different places, and to make friends.

It's a wonderful feeling to know that there are people who love you and care about you beyond your own borders. The only bad part about being an exchange student is that you have to say goodbye to your host country....but you leave knowing that they will always be there for you."

Last October, National Breast Cancer Awareness month, Rotaract of Shawnee State University raised over \$800 for breast cancer research by selling t-shirts and baked goods and by soliciting donations on campus. This was truly a group or team effort, with three different committees in Rotaract competing with each other to see who can raise the most amount of money. Each committee came up with their own fundraising scheme and worked all month to raise money. All of the money was donated to the American Cancer Society.

Attending RYLA was a fun informative experience. But it's really more what happened after that has turned out to be the reward. The skills I learned and confidence I gained allowed me to accomplish several things I wouldn't have done otherwise. I got a lot of personal satisfaction by successfully organizing and conducting a Purple Pinkie campaign at my high school. I was also asked by the club who sponsored me to speak to them about the experience

and it was awesome to be able to confidently speak to them and receive so many positive compliments afterward about how well I represented RYLA and presented myself. But the best part of all is attending RYLA moved me to join the Rotaract club at my college which I probably never would have thought about doing otherwise. So in a way, you could say, attending RYLA really did change the course of my life!!"

Rotary Youth Leadership Awards is Rotary's' leadership training program for young people. Our district held its' second event this July with 75 high school youth in attendance from throughout the district. With the success of this year's event behind us we are looking toward the 2013 RYLA Conference.

WONDERING HOW YOUR ROTARY CLUB CAN GET IN-VOLVED WITH RYLA?

Below are a few suggestions to help your Club participate in the RYLA experience:

- Your club may award up to two scholarships for a student to attend the RYLA conference. The cost is \$300.00 per student and although money and commitment isn't due until January 31, 2013 we encourage you to submit early. There is a maximum capacity of 96 spots for the 2013 conference that will be filled on a first come first serve basis.
- Student participants should be currently in the junior year.
- Start early NOW to identify/ recruit students to represent your club.
- Contact your area high schools and ASK them to assist you in identify-

ing those students in your community that have exhibited a potential for leadership but have **NOT** had the opportunity to lead or attend another leadership event – *these* are our ideal candidates.

Columbus Rotarian Bryan Noton bequeaths \$250,000 to Rotary International

The Columbus Rotary Club announced that the estate of one of its members, the late Bryan Noton, has made provisions for a \$250,000 donation to the Rotary International Foundation.

With this donation, Noton was inducted posthumously into the Arch. C. Klumph society. The society, named after the founder of the Rotary Foundation, honors all benefactors that support the Rotary foundation with a gift of \$250,00 or more

(cumulative or as a single gift).

All the Rotarians of District 6690 extend their sincere thanks to the estate of Bryon Noton for this generous gift to The Rotary Foundation.

In addition to the \$250,000 donated to Rotary International, Noton's estate further provided a \$25,000 donation to the Columbus Rotary Foundation a Phoenix Scholarship to be awarded annually in Noton's honor.

Noton is the fifth Ohioan to join the Arch C. Klumph Society and the first Columbus Rotarian to earn this distinction.

I am looking forward to working with your club to help make the coming year a high-water mark for RVS and your club.



Do you—

- Want to make a difference?
- Further international understanding
- Contribute to international good will and peace?
- Like challenges?
- Want to stretch your limits?

You can do all of this by joining a GSE team either as a team leader or a team member.

In May/June, 2012-13, District 6690 will be sending a team to Lima, Peru.

GSE Team Members have the opportunity to observe their vocations as practiced in another country and to share cultural experiences as they travel throughout the host District living with various host families. Most of the expenses of the Exchange, including airfare and room and board in the host District, are paid by the Rotary Foundation and the host District.

Each year, Rotary Clubs throughout the world exchange GSE teams made up of a Rotarian Team Leader and four young professional non-Rotarians. The objective is to promote cultural and vocational understanding and to create goodwill among people of different countries. Past District 6690 exchanges have been made with Italy, Brazil, India, Great Britain, Germany, Japan and Australia.

Group Study Exchange is one of the most valuable and rewarding Rotary programs. It is also one of the very best ways to introduce Rotary to non-Rotarians, many of whom will eventually join Rotary. During their onemonth stay, team members will live with local Rotarians, tour their cities, visit their workplaces, experience their culture and cultural events, talk with them about the world and world affairs, and develop life-long friendships and associations.

Requirements include:

- Team leader must be a Rotarian of district 6690 and in good standing.
- Team Member applicants must be non-Rotarians and not directly related to a Rotarian (no spouses, children, grandchildren). They must be working at the time of departure and need to be between 25 and 40 years old.

A handbook covering the Group Study Exchange program is available on the RI GSE webpage.

Applications are due to Catherine Baird cj. baird@yahoo.com GSE Chair by September 15. Interviews will be in early October. Team member (non-Rotarians) applications (form forthcoming) are due September 30 with interviews in late October.


