



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District 6690 Four-Way Test Speech Contest

The Rotary District 6690 Four-Way Test Speech Contest was held on 26 April 2014 in conjunction with the 2014 Rotary District in Chillicothe at Chillicothe High School. The Assembly was sponsored by District Governor Elect Randy Davies and the First Capital Rotary Club.

Sixteen High School students from Central and Southeastern Ohio who had won their local Rotary Club contest competed for honors and cash prizes. The subject of the speeches was applying the Rotary Four-Way Test in our everyday relationships with other people. The Rotary Four-Way Test is:

"Of the things we think, say or do,

- 1. Is it the TRUTH?,
- 2.2. Is it FAIR to all concerned?,
- 3.3. Will it BUILD GOODWILL and BETTER FRIENDSHIPS?,
- 4.4. Will it be BENEFICIAL to all concerned?"

Herbert J. Taylor who was President of the Club Aluminum Products Company, authored the Test in 1932. The Test was adopted by his company as a succinct code of business ethics.

Kellie Jones won first place and a cash prize of \$500. Kellie is a junior at Dublin Scioto High School and represented the Dublin Worthington Rotary Club. Korbinian Weidinger of New Concord won second place and a cash prize of \$250. Korbinian is a junior at John Glenn High School, is a Rotary exchange student from Germany and represented Cambridge Rotary. Andrea Kackley of Pleasant City won third place and a prize of \$125. Andrea is a senior at Meadowbrook High School and represented the Byesville Rotary Club.

First place winner Kellie Jones will reprise her winning speech for the attendees of the Rotary District Conference to be held at Cherry Valley Lodge in Newark in May.



Italian pianist performs at Marietta College

Francesco Attesti an Italian Pianist of international acclaim preformed. May 29 in the McDonough Auditorium at Marietta College. Attesti is considered one of the finest interpreters of the Romantic and Early Twentieth Century Repertoire.

The event was presented by the Marietta Noon and Morning Rotary Clubs with generous support from JD Byrider and Morrison, Inc. The event was free and open to the public.

IT upgrades provided to schools in Africa

Marietta College has partnered with the Rotary Club of Accra Ridge (Ghana) and Marietta Morning Rotary Club to provide information technology upgrades and computers to two rural schools in Central and Volta Regions of Africa.

Although Ghana has compulsory education for children 6-17 years of age, in rural villages especially, funds are insufficient to provide adequate facilities or supplies to support a meaningful education. "Free education" in Ghana translates into the government spending \$3.50 per child, which is woefully inadequate for teaching even a rudimentary curriculum. At the Gbi-Kpoeta School, the third-grade classroom has no walls, so classes are not held in inclement weather. At Mt. Zion Elementary in Old Tafo, the school has no water source and does not have electricity.

The Rotary Clubs and Marietta College have teamed up to provide basic assistance to these two schools. The goal is to provide electricity for the first time to Mt. Zion and refurbish a classroom at Gbi-Kpoeta into a computer lab. This will enable students, some for the first time, to benefit from an education through basic technology. The project is to be continued next year with the drilling of a borehole at Mt. Zion and improvements to the school buildings at Gbi-Kpoeta.

From May 15 to May 22, Rotarians from Ghana and six American professionals from Marietta College will converge at the schools to install computers and take the school administration and teachers through basic technology training to enable them to make use of the internet and other resources



to procure teaching materials.

Rotary brings together a global network of volunteer leaders dedicated to tackling the world's most pressing humanitarian challenges. Rotary connects 1.2 million members of more than 34,000 Rotary clubs in over 200 countries and geographical areas. Rotary Club of Accra Ridge is a group of 50 young service minded professionals with a passion for service above self.

Marietta College has organized service trips to Ghana since 2008, in which faculty, staff and students visited rural villages, and became involved with one school in particular, the Gbi Kpoeta Elementary School, in Hohoe, Volta region. In subsequent trips (2010, 2012), the team helped install electricity and computers, provided instruction for teachers and students in the use of computers, and developed plans for measuring progress.



Westerville Sunrise Rotary Presents Sixth Annual Field of Heroes

On Memorial Day weekend (May 23-26), the Westerville Sunrise Rotary Club hosted the sixth annual Field of Heroes at the corner of Cleveland Avenue and County Line Road West. Originally intended to be a one-time event, the event has become an annual tradition due to the outpouring of emotion and feedback from the community following the first Field of Heroes in 2009.

Three thousand eight-foot tall flags standing in a 100,000+ square foot field are the centerpiece of the Field of Heroes and provide an opportunity to honor one's personal heroes - whoever they are.

—a family member, a veteran, a member of the armed services, a teacher, a police officer or fire-fighter, or any other person who has made an impact on others' lives.

In 2014, the Field of Heroes paid tribute to Public Safety personnel with a special display honoring Fire and Police Personnel, a special Sunday evening ceremony in recognition of their service, and an education center portraying elements of all who first respond to call for assistance.

Back for a second year was the Field of Heroes 5K Run/Walk on Sunday, May 25th, allowing an active, alternative way for community members to honor their heroes. Other events included a Sat-



urday evening concert featuring the Central Ohio Brass Band, Sunday tours of local memorials, a flag retirement ceremony, the nightly playing of Taps at sunset, and other related activities.

All of Central Ohio was invited to visit the field 24 hours a day, between 1:00 pm Friday, May 23 and 1:00 pm Monday, May 26 to join the Westerville community in remembering and honoring their personal heroes, and re-connecting with the true meaning of Memorial Day.

Dr. Paul finished by congratulating all recipients and thanked Julie McClain and Don Riley for all their help with the morning program.

















































Fellowship brings some important ideas to mind, including sharing, connection, and community. Rotary is an amalgam of individual communities — the club, the district, the region, and the world — each offering a different type of fellowship.

Rotary Fellowships, which are open to Rotarians and Rotarian spouses, help foster international understanding and can contribute significantly to individual communities. Because fellowships must have a member base from at least three countries, they are rooted in local environments, but at the same time link Rotarians with similar interests all over the world.

For example, members of the <u>International Fellowship of Rotarian Scuba Divers</u>participate in group dives once or twice a year at different spots around the globe. While they are in these exotic places, they contribute to a service project carried out by a local Rotary club.

Each fellowship is officially recognized by the RI Board of Directors but operates independently of Rotary International, with its own rules, dues, requirements, and administrative structure.
