This has been an annual club service activity for over 12 years. On December 18th we will have our 19th annual whiteelephant gift exchange, which is one of our members favorite meetings of the year.

Columbus Rotary:

Columbus Rotary Veteran Student "Coaching" Project— An opportunity arose in 2012 for Columbus Rotary, Ohio, to mentor students at The Ohio State University. The difference in this mentoring program is that all of the students are military veterans.

The Ohio State University Veteran Student Coaching project was born out of the idea that these young people, as military veterans, have already given back to their community. Should Rotarians, who only have to give them some of our time and counsel, not help them succeed in their chosen vocation? It has been a perfect match of mature young people, thirsting for the knowledge that every Rotarian possesses and can give.

Columbus Rotarians have responded in quantity and quality.

The project engages the University's Office of Military and Veteran Services to get the word out to their Veteran Students and arrange for an on-campus lunch. Columbus Rotarians conduct two lunch sessions, one for 10 MBA students and one for 10 upper-class undergraduates. Each lunch has one to three Rotarian presenters who give a ten to twenty minute presentation after the Rotarians and students have met and dined together.

The real results come when the Veteran Students are able to network within their vocational area of interest by meeting successful Rotarians and non-Rotarians; oftentimes, resulting in internships, part-time jobs, permanent jobs and perhaps most important, learning how to adapt to the civilian work environment.

The experience can best be summed up in the words of one of the first students through the program. "This was the first group of gentlemen who had no hidden agenda. Their interests were pure and genuine. I often feel like veterans are treated like wounded zoo animals, a display that is photographed for the local paper and website, or just a photo-op / check-in-the-box for an organization, but the Rotarians seemed to genuinely just want to befriend us and help us succeed."

Dublin AM:

PackH2O of Columbus, Halcyon, and Dublin A.M.: Making a World of Difference

Dublin AM Rotary, in partnership with Halcyon Solutions of Dublin, Ohio, and PackH2O of Columbus, Ohio recently deployed life-transforming water backpacks in developing parts of India that are effected by the global water crisis. Working with Modern Architects for Rural India (MARI), the team of Dublin Rotary AM, Halcyon and PackH2O successfully executed on a plan that formed in summer 2013.

In October 2013 with money raised through Dublin AM Rotary, packs were delivered to members of the Hyderabad community that is served by MARI in the hopes of raising awareness about public health and the connection clean water has to improving living conditions for all.

Mohan Viddam, Chairman and CEO of Halcyon Solutions, will be personally visiting these communities in late 2013 to gain first hand knowledge of the impact the PackH2O water back packs are having on those who have received them. It is his long term vision to work with PackH2O and Dublin AM Rotary to raise more money for future distribution in 2014.

The award-winning PackH2O water carrier is designed to ease the burden of carrying household water from access point to home. It has a removable liner that is easily sanitized with exposure to sunlight. Puncture resistant and easy-to-use, it is a safe and effective way to carry and store clean water. The water backpack holds about 5 gallons of water – the amount of daily water used by people in developing economies.

The pack also relieves the physical stress of carrying water by distributing the burden evenly on the wearer's back. Its light weight--seven times lighter than the average water can--makes it more likely families will use it to get clean water.

Access to clean water is one of the most difficult and pressing problems in the world. The partnership of Pack H2O, Halcyon, and Dublin A.M. are making a difference in the lives people who might literally not live without us."

Columbus Rotary:

Obstacle course opens at Scioto Audubon Metro Park

After months of planning, designing and constructing, the Columbus Rotary Obstacle Course at Scioto Audubon Metro Park opened to the public on Saturday, October 26. Representatives from Columbus Rotary, Franklin County Metro Parks, Columbus 2020, Ohio State University Rotaract and ROTC as well as other young professional groups competed in a Challenge Team Run following the grand opening ceremony.

The free course features nine challenging obstacles and a half-mile trail designed to meet the recreational and competitive needs of youth 14 and older and active adults. The stations include: a tire run and flip, a tunnel crawl, a cargo climb, a balance beam, a belly crawl, monkey bars, an over/ under, a climbing wall, and a log run.

Columbus Rotary secured more than \$100,000 dollars in donations and in-kind services for the project and several members along with representatives from other service clubs invested more than 300 hours of work on the design and construction of the course.

"This project started in 2012 as one of many services projects celebrating Columbus Rotary's Centennial Year," said, Columbus Rotary President Steve Heiser. "Fellow Rotarians were enthusiastic and committed wholeheartedly to helping Metro Parks enhance the outdoor amenities at Scioto Audubon that ultimately contribute to the health and well-being of the Central Ohio community.

Located just outside of downtown Columbus, the 122-acre Scioto Audubon Metro Park is a mecca

for outdoor enthusiasts. The park features 3 miles of trails, a 2-acre dog park, frontage along the Scioto River for boating and fishing, various play structures for kids, the Grange Insurance Audubon Center and the a 35-foot high climbing wall, the largest free outdoor climbing wall in the country.

"Thanks to the generosity of Columbus Rotary in taking leadership in the design and construction of the obstacle course and trail, active adults and teens now have another opportunity to enjoy the outdoors, challenge themselves while improving their health and, best of all, have a lot of fun," said Metro Parks Executive Director John O'Meara.



December—Rotary Family Month


