






Power of the PIN

Vocational Service

It's hard to believe that one quarter of the 2013-2014 Rotary Year is already in our rear view mirror. Where does the time go? Here we are in October, which is Vocational Service Month in the RI Annual Calendar.

Vocational Service is the 2nd of Rotary's 5 Avenues of Service. Rotarians provide Vocational Service when they act ethically in their business dealings. A Rotarian can promote ethical behavior by:

- Using high ethical standards in their business dealings,
- Recognizing that all useful occupations are worthy of respect,
- Contributing professional expertise and skills to help address social problems and needs.

By the time you receive this, all club presidents should have received a separate email containing a list of nearly two dozen proven Rotary Vocational Service (RVS) projects for your club to consider. These projects vary in size and focus from elementary school through high school, college, non-school vocational service and several new areas in 2013-2014 for mature workers including Veterans.

If you haven't recruited a Vocational Service Chair for your club, or finalized your club's plans for Vocational Service this year, October is the right month to complete both of those important club tasks.

A specific number of Vocational Service projects will not be required for clubs to earn the District Governor's Award this year, but clubs are strongly encouraged to undertake as many projects as they can handle. So, October is a great time to focus your club's resources on Rotary Vocational Service.

Dan Slane, a member of the U.S.-China Economic & Security Review Commission, spoke to the Whitehall-Bexley Rotary Club on September 20, 2013, at the Columbus Country Club.

Commissioner Slane was reappointed to the Commission by Speaker of the House John Boehner for a third two year term expiring in December 31, 2012. He has previously served as chairman in 2010 and vice chairman in 2011 and has served on this Commission for six years.

His topic was, "Fixing Our Economy and Our Country." He discussed several issues of significant importance impacting United States trade and economic policies.

Commissioner Slane served for two years on active duty as a U.S. Army Captain in Military Intelligence and also served as a Case Officer with the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency. He worked in The White House during the Ford Administration.

In 1996, Commissioner Slane became a member of The Ohio State University Board of Trustees and served as chairman from 2005-2006.

Commissioner Slane is the founder and co-owner of the Slane Company, whose principal business includes real estate development, lumber and furniture.

He received a Bachelor of Science in Business Administration and Juris Doctorate from The Ohio State University. He holds a Master's Degree in International law from the Europa Institute at the University of Amsterdam in the Netherlands.

The Slane Company is located in Gahanna. Mr. Slane is a resident of Westerville.

The International Services Committee of Dublin AM Rotary has arranged for the club to partner with PackH20 to send water backpacks to India, Haiti, and Kenya.

The committee reported to club members that they will have mission opportunities in 2014 to Nairobi, Kenya, to provide healthcare seminars and to distribute reading glasses. There are also opportunities in India to work in leper colonies and to provide glasses and dental care. Other opportunities may include furnishing LN-4artfical hand. Either will cost \$3200, but also offers opportunities to go on safari or see the Taj Mahal. The trips are open to Rotarians and families.

The club is also helping support John and Rachel Koon, who made a presentation to the club in July about their mission to Moldova. They will let us know when they have hired new medical staff to assist so that the club can send funding.

In the club's school libraries in Turkey project, the small, portable libraries were stored for the summer, but will be redeployed in September. Photos of the project are forthcoming. The International Services Committee will be partnering with the Literacy Committee on a fund raising shred-ding event to support this effort. In addition, the club will be receiving a \$500 District 6690 grant.

Supporting La Via in Moldova

International Services has supported a part-time medical assistants for an orphanage in Chisinau, Moldova for two years. Rita and Harvey Hook's daughter, Rachel, and her husband, John Koon, are missionaries at this La Via orphanage. Formerly in the Soviet block, Moldova is a very poor country where many parents abandon their children to seek work in another country. For this year, we have supplied funds to hire a new assistant, Donica.

Donica will work with 60 children who come from socially-vulnerable families or who have been orphaned. These children are taught basic hygiene like bathing and proper dental care. They also are checked regularly for lice and other medical issues which then need to be addressed by a medical doctor, dentist or ophthalmologist. In after school programs, the children learn how to wash themselves and their clothing and to maintain good personal hygiene and clean living environments.





All candidates need to receive approval of their club members or board.






