District Governor's Message



"2016 Council on Legislation"

Did you know that Districts and Clubs can have an effect on the Bylaws of Rotary International?

The Council on Legislation (COL) is the legislative body of Rotary International and it meets every three years to review proposals to amend the Constitutional Documents of the organization (the RI Constitution, the RI Bylaws, and the Standard Rotary Club Constitution.) It also considers other district-endorsed resolutions and club items.

The next meeting of the COL will be held in the Spring, 2016.

However, all proposed enactments by Districts need to be voted on by the Clubs in the District and then submitted to Rotary International by DECEMBER 31st, 2014. Time is short if you have an idea that you want to bring forth. You should act now and begin by contacting your COL delegate.

Information on the COL can be found in the Manual of Procedures, Chapter 17, in the 2013 version, and in the RI Bylaws articles 7 & 8. Procedures for proposals can be found on pages 106-107 of the 2013 Manual of Procedures.

John Germ selected as 2016-17 Rotary president

John F. Germ, a member of the Rotary Club of Chattanooga, Tennessee, USA, and chair of the International PolioPlus Committee, is the selection of the Nominating Committee for President of RI in 2016-17. He will become the president-nominee on 1 October if there are no challenging candidates.

For Rotary to thrive, Germ says, members must face current and future challenges and opportunities with "passion, enthusiasm, perseverance, and above all, integrity."

"I envision Rotary boldly and creatively engaging the success of polio eradication, membership and identity issues, strengthening clubs, work with youth – our future lifeblood, and the creation of critical, strategic partnerships," says Germ. "The 2016-17 Rotary year offers a tremendous opportunity for Rotary International and the Foundation partnership unified and thriving, on all levels, via the six areas of focus."

Germ says no one should ever have to ask, "What is Rotary?"

"We will enhance Rotary's public image by successfully and enthusiastically marketing who we are, what amazing things we are doing, and incredibly, have done locally and globally," says Germ. With the global economy still unpredictable, Germ says Rotary must make participation affordable and "also be unfailingly diligent in efforts to ensure we spend every dollar effectively and efficiently," he says.

In 1965, after four years in the U.S. Air Force, Germ, an engineer, joined Campbell and Associates Inc., an engineering consulting firm. He now serves as the company's board chair and chief executive officer.

He also serves on the boards of several organizations including the Public Education Foundation, Orange Grove Center Inc., and the Blood Assurance Inc. He is the founder and treasurer of the Chattanooga State Technical Community College Foundation and is president of the Tennessee Jaycee Foundation.

A Rotary member since 1976, Germ has served Rotary as vice president, director, Foundation trustee and vice chair, chair of Rotary's US\$200 Million Challenge, and RI president's aide. He is a recipient of Rotary's Service Above Self Award and The Rotary Foundation's Citation for Meritorious Service and Distinguished Service Award. He and his wife, Judy, are members of the Arch Klumph Society.

Our Club has contributed \$1,000 and expertise in the areas of social media, web design and media relations. We're calling on all Rotary Clubs to match our \$1,000 donation. Several weeks ago, Dublin AM received an email from the President of the Rotary Club that hosted members of the club in Santo Domingo in 2012, asking when the club was coming back. They were looking forward to working with us again.

We are in the early stages of planning a Mission Trip to fit LN-4 prosthetic hands on amputees. We are looking to travel to the Dominican Republic either in October 2014 or April 2015. The timing would depend on what works best for everyone.



The biggest cost of this trip is the airfare. Currently, round trip tickets are between \$650-\$1000, depending on airline, stops, etc. The Rotarians picked us up at the airport, housed and fed us. For the Mission Emanuel volunteering, we stayed in the same hotel for 1 night as mission volunteers who came from all over the US. We ate at the hotel and I think that total cost was around \$200. Some of us went to an all inclusive beach resort, of which there are many, on the front side of our trip. That part was a lot of fun but definitely optional.

Gallipolis:


On July 29 the Gallipolis Rotary presented building materials to the Field of Hope Community Campus (FOH) to be used for building the Community Food Pantry room interiors. The building material purchase was coordinated through James Gruber and Thomas Do-It Center. The generous donation totaled \$4000 worth of building materials, and the material will be used to frame out the walls of three rooms to be used in the Food Pantry.

Moving the Food Pantry location from the Vinton Baptist Church will allow movement and storage of larger quantities of food from the Second Harvest Food Bank and local donors as well. Last year the Food Pantry served about 8500 clients. The expanded Food Pantry will have clothing available, and an appliance shop for low cost appliances is also being considered.

Thirteen Gallipolis Rotary volunteers plus six FOH volunteers distributed the building material to the future Food Pantry rooms, which are now under roof as the FOH roof construction continues. The team had a great time of fellowship after working together by enjoying a pulled pork dinner compliments of Steve Forge' and his redneck cuisine. James Gruber, representing Sanctify Films, gave a demonstration of their newly acquired Quad Copter and its aerial filming capability.

The Gallipolis Rotary donation was compliments of a matching grant from Rotary USA and the local Rotary club. Rotary is a community organization with a goal of building up our local community through service projects, support of other community organizations, and education through the speakers/meetings held once a week.

The Field of Hope Community Campus is a 501(c)3 faith based non-profit outreach with a plan for an expanded community Food Pantry, Youth Center, and Residential Rehabilitation facility. Approval has been received to purchase the Common Grounds property in Vinton, Ohio, that will serve as the women's residences for the FOH rehabilitation facility. Common Grounds will be developed into a 16 person facility initially with the ability to expand to about twice that number. One goal of the FOH is to join other service providers, law enforcement, the legal system, and others to eradicate the drug abuse culture from our community.




Upper Arlington/Grandview (Tri-Village):


Zanesville RYLA Participant Shows that the Future is Bright
