Rotarians,




#### District Governor Nominee Designate for 2017-18 announced

**Living Rotary Youth Exchange Vicariously** 


I am guilty of being jealous of exchange students.

One thing I've learned is that the youth of the world are 95% the same. They have the same likes, dislikes, desires, plans, and once you understand this you feel really good about the future.


How do you volunteer? Just ask. There are openings on the club and district level. We have all different types of jobs from paperwork, to directing the students, to training jobs.


#### Newark Rotary Club Goes Big For 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary

#### Gahanna Rotary:


Gahanna Rotary is "Lighting-Up" Rotary like no other!!!



#### **Byesville Rotary:**

On Friday and Saturday (December 19 and 20), Byesville Rotarians completed their annual Christmas Food Basket service project. One hundred and ninety families signed up for the program. Each family was presented with 1 box of perishable including a turkey, milk, eggs, oleo, and bags of potatoes, onions, apples and oranges and one box of non-perishables and canned goods.

Members met on Friday to construct 360 boxes. They also picked up and sorted canned goods and finally filled one box for each family in preparation for distribution. On Saturday, Byesville Rotarians, club friends and family members arrived at 6:00am to unload perishables and begin filling the perishables boxes. Distribution of the boxes began at 7:00 am and continued until 11:30 am.

Any food remaining was donated to the Byesville Main Avenue Methodist Church food pantry and to the Stop Nine Church of Christ food pantry.


This food service program was the largest for the club in recent years. Club members are grateful for local community members and business that supported this service project.
