#### **District Governor's Message**


Rotarians,

Dan, thank you for sharing your life with others. You were the true example of Service Above Self.



#### Rotary Youth Exchange - The Typical Exchange Student Is Atypical


There is no such thing as a typical exchange student. Many types of kids can excel at exchange and not fit into any one mold.

The exchange experience, given a chance, will positively impact any student who completes the program. I often compare it to boot camp in the military. You go through both happy and unhappy emotional swings but in the end you exit the experience confident, self-assured and more mature. Add to this, you also come out of the experience as a man or woman of the world, multi-lingual and able to feel at home anywhere.

Some of our most successful exchange students don't fit any mold. We have had great students and not so great students doing great in the program. The fit, talented athletes and the out of shape do equally well. Extroverts and introverts complete the program. Funny, but introverts are much less introverted after the experience. One benefit everyone gets is an enhanced ability to make friends. You are forced to make friends just by the very nature of the experience.

People with positive outlooks do great on exchange, but I know of at least three nihilists who were fantastic exchange students and they were some of my favorite kids. You see a transformation in attitudes in the darker outlook kids.

One positive which always comes out of exchange is a question of what the student values most.



# Rotary Youth Exchange, con't

Exchange students find themselves putting a much higher value on experiences over material possessions. Especially travel and life experiences. They want to explore; they want to do things rather than own things. Family becomes very important to exchange students. School becomes a means to accomplish what they want to do.


Many students discover their ideal path of study, so they can enjoy their jobs as much as they did their exchange. Many become business people, or teachers, or medical professionals. Some go to the law, especially international law. A sizeable number go into foreign service or nongovernmental organizations (NGOs) so they can have an impact on the world. Studying foreign languages and the related, study of teaching of English as a 2nd language (ESL) is growing in popularity because of the opportunity to work overseas, or work with foreign students.

If you know students at your local junior or high school (lower classmen), offer them the chance to look into exchange. The benefits of the program are life changing. A country kid can use it to experience an urban outlook. A city kids can discover the expanding vistas of the rural world. Don't think the B- student can't do it. For most of them it turns on the light in their brain which improves their scholarship.

Rotary Youth Exchange is also the most affordable of all the exchange programs. It's very doable for any student. It's actually considered a scholarship as the cost are very low.

Members from each service club will be staffing the collection sites for 1 hour shifts between 10:00 am and 6:00 pm.


















#### West Lafayette:

The Rotary Club of West Lafayette honored two of its recently deceased members for their long years as Rotarians and their service to the community of West Lafayette and Coshocton County.


