Rotarians,



Understanding Cultural Differences Through Rotary Exchange


Misunderstandings between our American Culture and other cultures are rampant in our society because we aren't really exposed to the intricacies of other cultures very often. RYE (Rotary Youth Exchange) is an excellent way to find bridges over that gap between America and other cultures.

What seemed weird and different melts away after you actually become acquainted with and close to someone from other places. It's the main reason you would want to send your child on a Rotary Youth Exchange because exchange is THE way to breakdown stereotypes and misunderstandings. What seems foreign stops being foreign and becomes normal after a very short exposure.

Having an exchange student in your home brings this to light quickly. Most people stop seeing differences and familiarity breeds understanding and love. Your children and grandchildren don't look at your exchange student as a "foreigner" but as an important member of your extended family.

Having Moslem student from Kyrgyzstan or Turkey helps you to understand that being Moslem doesn't mean that followers of the Koran are terrorists or even Anti-American. Having an Asian student become part of your family means you learn to appreciate the rich and friendly culture of those countries. The warmth, friendly South American student might add a exciting to spark to your daily life.

The internet has made the world a very small place and once you have experienced the joy of having an exchange student in your house, you can still stay connected with him or her through Facebook, Skype, email and Twitter.



Rotary Youth Exchange, con't

Outbound exchange students (our kids going overseas) get a very quick lesson that the USA isn't the cultural center of the universe. Once you are immersed into another country you must adapt quickly and work at improving your language skills. You also need to learn about how to live in another country as a national of that country. If you are in Turkey you have to start thinking like a Turk, or as a Brazilian in Brazil, or as a German in Germany. You have to be very present in the society and not have your mind lounging back in the USA. You also have to be proactive. We call it the "6 B's"

- 1. Be First
- 2. Be Curious
- 3. Be on Purpose
- 4. Be Grateful
- 5. Be of Service
- 6. Be Here Now

These are key elements in succeeding as an exchange student. They are also not a bad way to live and most exchange students carry this advice into their daily lives after exchange.

Become part of this. Host a student. Urge your kids, grandkids, nieces, nephews and kids of your friends to apply for the International High School Scholarships offered by District 6690.








Athens AM:





While the icy temperatures of winter still have a grip on District 6690, Columbus Rotary is thinking "summer sunshine" as it begins seeking additional financial support for its Summer Scholars Program.


Unfortunately, many gifted students from financially challenged families do not have an opportunity during summer break to explore their special talents through summer enrichment programs. That's where Summer Scholars comes in. In conjunction with Columbus Public Schools, Rotarians review proposals from students in grades 4-11 who have their heart set on attending various summer camps offered in math, science, technology, music and painting, to name a few.

To appreciate the value of the Summer Scholars, Rotarians only need to read the many thank-you notes sent by participants. For example, Taylor H., grade 8, wrote about his experience dissecting a pig and "learning so much about the nervous, respiratory and other systems." Carly F., grade 8, thanked Rotary for her Be-Wise scholarship that enabled her to "meet other girls who share the same interest as I do in math and science. I made new friends and learned about things I didn't get to learn in class."

During the past 16 years, more than 900 gifted students have benefited from the Summer Scholars program. Today, the popularity of the Summer Scholars Program has grown so much that additional financial supporters are being recruited to increase the \$15,000 contribution by Columbus Rotary to \$25,000.




