Rotarians,













Deadline to save— December 31, 2014. Buy a plate by this date.

Call for changes in Rotary legislation



Dear Rotarians,

As we are nearing the end of 2014, there are less than two months to submit proposed legislation for the 2016 Council on Legislation. Rotary International must **receive** clubs' and districts' proposed legislation, including confirmation of the district's endorsement from the district governor, by **31 December 2014**. Please note that this deadline is strictly enforced and proposed legislation received after the deadline will not be considered.

To help you prepare legislation, we have developed the new How to Propose Legislation course in Rotary's Learning Center. The course can be found by going to <u>My Rotary</u>>Learning & Reference>Learning Center. Additional information and useful tools for the 2016 Council have been posted on the Council on Legislation section of the Rotary website at <u>www.rotary.org/col</u>. Proposed legislation should be submitted to Rotary through the online form here: <u>https://rotary.qualtrics.com/SE/?SID=SV_86x9bQkfU8vwXIh</u>. A paper form is also available upon request, for those who are unable to submit online.

Proposed legislation must be endorsed by the district at a district conference, district resolutions meeting, or through a ballot-by-mail. The district governor at the time of submission confirms the endorsement by either submitting the proposed legislation through the online form or, <u>if legislation</u> <u>is submitted by someone other than the district governor</u>, by emailing their confirmation to <u>council services@rotary.org</u>.

The trees will be lit Thanksgiving through Christmas.




Mount Vernon:


New Albany:


Zanesville City Schools annual Children's Christmas Party supports disadvantaged children
