Council on Legislation

Dear Council on Legislation delegates, District Governors, District Governorselect, and regional Rotary leaders,

The 2016 Council on Legislation was by all accounts a great success, thanks to the strong commitment, diligence and hard work of its delegates in carrying out the Council's critical role in Rotary's governance. The Council adopted a number of forward looking enactments, including several that provide greater membership and meeting flexibility. These approved changes in policy will give those clubs that so desire more freedom to determine the categories of membership they offer and when, where, and how a club chooses to meet.

Over the past 15 years, Rotary has carried out pilot programs that have explored new definitions of membership, classifications, and the club experience. We have consistently found that when clubs are given the freedom to determine how to hold their meetings, the composition of their membership, and what defines engagement, the club is more vibrant and better able to grow.

While this flexibility is available to those clubs that choose to amend their bylaws, a club that wishes to continue to adhere to the traditional requirements regarding meetings, attendance, structure, or categories of membership may continue to do so.



CGWE Request to District 6690 Rotary Clubs

C.G. Women's Empowerment is global grant through Columbus Rotary. The club is asking other clubs to participate. CGWE will be applying for a Rotary Club International Global Grant in 2016 in support of our efforts to build three water wells in our service area in Oromia, Ethiopia.

The total cost for this project is \$45,000, which includes the cost of engineering, equipment, staff/wages, construction, installation and operation of the well. CGWE's partners in this endeavor include Design Outreach (a nonprofit engineering firm based in Columbus), Hundee (our established partner NGO in Oromia) and Rotary Club of Addis Ababa Bole Ethiopia.

Columbus Rotary

Access to clean, safe water is a basic human necessity and, CGWE believes, should be a basic human right. The benefits of providing water to families living in poverty have been well documented over the past several years. The well CGWE would like to build will have a daily impact on close to 600 people, and may potentially benefit thousands more living within walking distance of the well. In addition, the water that will become available because of this well will allow for greatly improved care of the 82 cows which have been provided to women by CGWE to date - and the 23 calves born to them so far!

Our plan for 2016-17 includes not only building a well, but also provide an additional 35-40 cows, and raising funds to build and staff an animal clinic within the next two years.

In order to attain the projected expense of the water wells in the amount of \$45,000.00, CGWE is planning to solicit from local clubs to raise \$13,000.00 and will apply to the Global Grant for the remaining balance. CGWE is kindly asking local Rotary Clubs to help us on raising part of the \$13,000.




Fourteenth Anniversary of the Zanesville Daybreak Outstanding Student Musicians Awards

Details of the Reverse Osmosis water treatment plant project in India:

Mohan Viddam of the Dublin A.M. Rotary (Rotarian of the Year award winner in 2013/2014) is a business owner of an IT company in Dublin and resides in Dublin. He is actively involved in about a dozen social work projects —5 in his birth place of Hyderabad, India and 7 in Columbus, Ohio. He is involved with installing Reverse Osmosis (RO) plants in villages in India. Having installed the first RO plant in June 2015, he is now working on installing RO plants in around 35 villages.

Of these 35 plants, 8 are funded by the Dublin A.M. Rotary under the leadership of Debbie Lutz, head of the International Committee, and the rest are funded by Mohan and his friends in India and the U.S. Mohan is partnering with a company called Community Pure Water (<u>CPW</u>) located in India to install, operate and maintain the RO plants, which has installed around 200 RO plants in India so far. The founder of this organization is a New Jersey based entrepreneur of Indian origin, who found success during the Internet boom, and is now dedicated to various philanthropic works in India.

Dublin AM

- The village must have at least 500 or more families to install a 500 LPH (
 - All the RO plants that we install have a prominent plaque displayed inside each plant room with the logo of the Dublin A.M. Rotary and other participating sponsors.
- The village must provide the following:
 - 15' x 15' concrete plant room to house the RO hardware
 - raw water source, such as a bore well
 - an electrical connection to the plant room provided by the local village
- Purified water will be sold at Rs. 5 for 20L, i.e. 25 paisa per liter (approx. 1/3 of a US cent per liter)
- CPW pays the salary of a local operator from that village to run the plant, replaces all filters periodically and repairs/replaces hardware, such as motors/pumps, etc. so, it's based on a self-sustaining model which can continue ad-infinitum
 - No further funding is needed from the village or sponsor.
 - The RO unit has an ATW (AnyTime Water) feature, using a smart-card (debit card concept) technology, to dispense 20L of RO water any time of the day or night, without the supervision of the local operator.
- Total cost of a plant is around \$3800, of which the sponsor pays \$1900 and CPW matches another \$1900.
