


District Governor's Message

Rotary Youth Exchange:



My Rotary Tips

"My Rotary" has many resources you can use. You need to register for "My Rotary" before you will be able to use these resources.

Before you start, you will need:

- An email address.
- Internet access.
- It will help Rotary International ID you if you also have your member ID. You can find your ID on the address label of your Rotarian. You can find it the 2nd line down, just above your



name. It is a 9 digit number that looks like this: #555444555#.

 A password with 8 characters. One letter must be uppercase; one must be lowercase, and one character must be a number.

The links in the newsletter are live. Click on the link to go to the web site.

Go to the Rotary International web site: www.rotary.org

- Select the <My Rotary> link at the very top of the page.
- You will move to a new page. Select the <Sign in/Register> link at the very top of the page.
- You will move to a new page. Locate and select the <Create Account> box.
- Fill in the boxes with appropriate information and click on the little round button indicating you are over 18. The little button should get filled in with a little black dot.
- Select <Continue>
- You will move to a new page. Continue filling in the boxes and following the on screen instructions to finish registering.

You will get an email to confirm that you are registered. The email will be from donotreply@rotarymailings.org. You will need to click on the designated link in the email to activate your account.

- You will be taken to a web page and asked to fill out a form to finish your account activation.
- Make sure you write down or memorize your email address and password. You will need them to log into "My Rotary" each time you want to use it.
