Rotary Youth Exchange:

Why Is It So Hard To Recruit Exchange Students?

The sad thing is high school students should be pounding down our doors to become exchange students. There is no better way to grown up quickly; become confident; self assured; conscious of the world; a better student, and bilingual. And Rotary has the best program hands down and District 6690 is considered the gold standard in Rotary Youth Exchange. We have the awards to prove it.



The real problem is as Rotarians we haven't done enough to get the word out to our kids in the schools that this opportunity is out there for them. Done properly there would be literally hundreds of applications for youth exchange is District 6690 alone. This program does more to change our kids lives for the better than anything you could do for them. There are two or three kids in every high school in 6690 who should be exchange students. That is about 2000 kids. Right now about 15 participate.

Get the word out about a great program.

The way Exchange changes kids is profound.

They learn a language the way it was meant to be learned, as a practical way to communicate. Learned that way, a language stays with you forever. Many of our students develop local accents so good people don't know they are Americans.

They are locked into the new culture and it absorbs them. They don't learn culture from the outside like a tourist, but as an integral part of the culture. They have Moms and Dads, brothers and sisters, as well as great friends and people they learn to love. The culture is real.

Many of our kids today can't manage public transportation, or be confident enough to do things they should know as adults. Exchange students learn these things quickly. They are taught how to maneuver around strange places and keep themselves safe. They learn to be responsible for their own lives and how to avoid doing stupid things. At the same times they learn to not be afraid of the new or different, but to get the most from it.

They see the world not as a bunch of diverse countries, but as a wonderful place where some of their best friends live. Mexicans, Frenchmen, Spaniards, Brazilians, Japanese, Taiwanese, Chileans, Norwegians aren't strange

foreigners, they are beloved friends named Juan, Aggie, Marie, Roberta, Carla, Naoki, Hei Weh, Cathy and Ingrid. When a horrible disaster happens in the world, exchange students are in-







stantly trying to contact their friends to make sure they are OK. Exchange students care.

To run this program takes effort and commitment. We have to get out to the schools and teach them about the program. We have hundreds of excellent examples to show and once a school district sees the results your job is done. We need to find host families. Being a host family is getting other people to share in your family and you learn to love and care for them.




