REGISTRATION & TIMING: Check in will begin at one half hour before the contest. The contest starting time will be 9:00 AM. A pizza lunch with beverages will be provided. The entire contest, judging, lunch should end between 12:00 PM and 1:00 PM but is dependent upon the number of contestants.

PARTICIPANTS: High School students who are winners of a District 6690 Rotary Club contest are eligible to participate. Prior contest winners of the District 6690 contest may participate but must have a speech different from a prior winning speech.

RULES: The complete rules are in a separate attachment.

ESSAY CONTEST: An essay contest has been added and the rules and registration are covered in separate attachments.

PARTICIPATION at the DISTRICT ASSEMBLY and other DISTRICT EVENTS: The First place winner will be asked to speak again the same day at the Rotary District Assembly which is running concurrently with the contest. The First place winner may be requested to speak during other Rotary District events TBA by mutual convenience of the winner and the District.

The Wellston Rotary Club was privileged to have Valleri Crabtree as the speaker at its regular meeting Wednesday Dec. 30. Valleri is a low key but powerful speaker who spoke on "Is it the Truth' one of the four items on the Rotary's Four Way test.

The Four Way test is a simple easily remembered guide, four items, 24 words, to encourage the right conduct, for both businesses and individuals. Valleri did an excellent job of making six key points about 'Is it the Truth,' one of which was, is it the truth or a trick, and our individual obligation to search for the truth.

Valleri, who lives in Florida, grew up in Wellston, and brought along with her, her daughter Alex, and her mother Ida Mae Crabtree, a well-known, and retired teacher in the Wellston City School System.

Valleri Crabtree has had an amazing career, a graduate of law school from Capital University, published two spiritual books, and hosted a weekly radio show for three years. She is very involved with her community in Florida, as a member of numerous organizations, and as a volunteer for several charitable and non profit organizations.

Valleri is currently running as a candidate for the U.S. House of Representatives, 9th District in Florida.

Dick encouraged by his fellow Rotarians authored a book on St. Clairsville's namesake—Governor Arthur St. Clair. During his 40-years of military and public service to America before, during and after the revolution, St. Clair was one of Washington's most trusted military strategists, serving as Major General, Congressman, President of Congress and Federal Governor of America's first expansion west of the Ohio River.

The Rotary Club of St. Clairsville decided to fund an historical plaque as a community project. The plaque was placed in front of the Belmont County Court House and dedicated by the Ohio Historical Society.

Dick suggests that funding an historical marker memorializing an area's local history is an excellent project for a Rotary club. The Ohio Historical Society manages a state program, approves the subject and the text, and attends the dedication ceremony. The Historical society does not fund the production of the marker which typically costs between \$2300-\$2500.

Mount Vernon Mount Vernon club will be busy in the new year. George Small, one of their members, is looking for people to travel to Africa to work on a water project. The club is supporting this service project by raising funds for travel expenses. Monetary and airline mile donations are welcome.

The club has begun encouraging high school seniors and adults who want to further their academic careers to apply for the scholarships. Four \$1000 scholarships will be awarded. The deadline to apply is April 15.

One method the club is using to raise money is by encouraging members to use their Kroger Plus Shopper's Card. Club members are asked to sign into their account and choose the Mount Vernon Rotary Foundation as the non-profit organization to receive Kroger community Rewards whenever the shopper uses their Kroger card.





Byesville Rotary provides 175 families with Xmas food baskets

Byesville Rotary provided food baskets to 175 families living in the Rolling Hills School District. This meant the club provided food for about 700 children and adults.

Rolling Hills Schools contributed hundreds of canned goods. Each school held a canned food drive. The schools provided all the non-perishables in the food baskets. The Rotary club purchased the perishable items: turkeys, milk, eggs, milk, bread, potatoes, onion, apples, and oranges.

Students at Meadowbrook High School held a competition among classrooms. Which were challenged to collect enough canned goods to fill in the doorway of the classroom. The winning classroom partnered with the students at Brook and combined the canned goods collected at Brook with the cans the high school class collected. Byesville Elementary held their drive in conjunction with their Literacy Night.

The club used several methods to raise funds for this project. Members solicited donations from local businesses and community members. The club also held a successful fundraiser in October by collecting funds at the intersection of Main and 2^{nd} streets in Byesville. Additionally, the club wrote a District grant.
