RI President sends message to Rotary Clubs

Message from Rotary International President

My dear friends,

The month of March highlights one of our areas of focus: water and sanitation. Something as simple as clean water is often taken for granted but is still so desperately needed in many countries around the world. In fact, even now, 748 million people today are living without access to clean water.

That is why my <u>last two presidential conferences</u> will focus on WASH (Water and Sanitation Health) in Schools, where my hope is that we will highlight the important role that water and sanitation plays in the education of all children. In addition, Rotary is taking part in World Water Day on 22 March. Rotary has been working to build healthier communities around the world, including countries like <u>Ghana</u>. You can help your fellow club members by <u>making a special gift</u> that supports projects like these.

Rotary now accepting applications for the 2017-18 Rotary Peace Fellowship The spike in regional and local conflicts around the globe has boosted the need for professionals skilled in waging peace. The fully funded Rotary Peace Fellowship increases the capacity of current and emerging peace leaders to prevent and resolve conflict through academic training, field experience, and professional networking. Applications are due by 31 May.

Presidential citation deadline is 1 April

My <u>citation</u> was created to help set goals and create activities for the Rotary year that develop vibrant, active clubs. At least 300 clubs have achieved all the goals I have set forth and over 12,000 clubs have completed the mandatory activities. I encourage you all to have your clubs work towards completing as many goals as possible before the deadline. Here are some that you can accomplish in the coming weeks:

- Use <u>Rotary Club Central</u> to report club accomplishments in Public Image and Humanitarian Service
- Have club members register in My Rotary
- Share a project or contribute to one on Rotary Ideas
- Post completed projects in Rotary Showcase
- Support our Foundation with a gift of at least \$20

- Work with your <u>Rotary Community Corps</u> to assess community needs

District 6690 Youth Exchange wins award

NAYEN, An Experience We Won't Forget

District 6690 was the host District at the *North American Youth Exchange Network Conference* last month in Cincinnati.

NAYEN is a gathering of every Rotary District in the USA, Canada and Mexico who participate in Rotary Youth Exchange. Because of this, Rotary Districts from around the world come to this conference to make connections. During my time at the conference I met, befriended and spent time with Rotarians from Brazil, Bolivia, Italy, France, Germany, Colombia, Mexico, Canada, Croatia, Thailand, Taiwan, Japan, and many other countries. Every person at that conference is a volunteer who donates countless hours and treasure on the Youth Exchange Program.

District 6690 was honored with a Gold Award as one of the premier Rotary Youth Exchange Programs in North America during the conference. We have won this award nearly every year for 6 years. Very few Rotary Districts have won it once.

Among the guest is James Alexander, the man from the US Department of State in charge of Youth Exchange programs.

For me personally, I reconnected with people I have been working with and be friends with from all over the USA and Canada, through the four days of tours we conducted. We did tours of Louisville and Lexington, Kentucky; Dayton, Ohio and a day trip around Cincinnati.

During the tours we had some amazing encounters. One Italian Rotarian who had written a book at an incident in Italian Aviation made a formal presentation of the book to the U.S. Air Force Museum during our Dayton Tour. One of our tour participants is the nephew of the author of *Curious George*, which was dedicated to one of his uncles, who was a curious young man named George.

A honor during the first day of the conference was meeting Dr. Henry Heimlich, inventor of the Heimlich Maneuver and Heimlich Chest Drainage valve and Cincinnati Rotarian.

The conference is dedicated to perfecting the practice and improving the Rotary Youth Exchange program.

Everyone in our district RYE Committee was part of this conference. John Koetz of Columbus Rotary, did an excellent job as conference chair. Walter Lundstrom made a presentation. Sema Thimmes, Inbound chair, was in charge of volunteers. Walter Lundstrom was Co-Chair, Helen Chan was in charge of registration, Bill McMurray ran the 2 Pre Tours, Spousal Program and 1 post tour.

All in all we had about twelve 6690 Rotarians as volunteers. DGN Shane Pyle (a long time RYE volunteer), DGD Craig Maxey, Youth Services Chair Roe Mauro, all played a role in the success of the conference and it was the most successful NAYEN conference with nearly 500 participants. There were universal raves from all participants.

NAYEN is another instance where you discover Rotarians the world over are wonderful, giving people, dedicated to the notion of Service Above Self, World Peace and Rotary Youth Exchange.

Club Activities




