We are quickly approaching Oct. 24, World Polio Day. Thank you to all the clubs that have held or are planning fundraisers to help eradicate polio. We are this close! If your club has not planned

a fundraiser yet, it is not too late. We have the entire Rotary year.

I am encouraged by the enthusiasm that our District has for Rotary's End Polio Now efforts. World Polio Day is observed in late October to honor the birthday of Dr. Jonas Salk, who led the development of the first polio vaccine.

Delaware Rotarian and District Secretary Fran Veverka is working with City Barbeque to hold a fundraiser for Polio Eradication. City Barbeque will be giving 25 percent of each visit back to Rotary.

This close to eradication

A MESSAGE FROM THE ROTARY INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT



Every Thursday morning, I receive an email from the World Health Organization with an update on the status of polio eradication.

It contains a wealth of information, country by country: where and how immunization campaigns are being conducted, how many millions of children are being vaccinated, and where environmental surveillance has found evidence of circulating virus.

But every week, when that email appears in my inbox, my heart seems to stop for just a moment until I read the first few lines – and learn whether a child was paralyzed by wild poliovirus that week.

Thirty years ago, 1,000 children were paralyzed by polio every single day. Since then, we've marked our progress, year by year, week by week. We've celebrated as country after country, region after region has been declared polio-free. As we've come closer and

closer to our goal, and the number of cases has dropped further and further, the children those numbers reflect have become less and less of an abstraction. When I open that Thursday email, I don't wonder what number I'll see. I wonder, was a child paralyzed this week or not?

We are so close to eradication – but there is so much work left to do.

World Polio Day is a tremendous opportunity for clubs to highlight Rotary, and our historic work to eradicate polio, in their own communities. It is also a great way to take advantage of the challenge from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation:

For every dollar that Rotary raises for polio eradication, the Gates Foundation will give two more.

Rotarian Spotlight: Connie Pelletier WELLSTON ROTARY



If you're looking for a role model to "Be the Inspiration" this year, we've found her in Connie Pelletier. Although born into a difficult family situation and placed in foster care as a teen, Connie overcame childhood adversity and graduated from Vinton County High School. And she was just getting warmed up.

Shortly after earning that diploma, Connie moved to Wellston and began a successful, 20-year career with American Electric Power. It was here in Wellston that she also found her purpose - to serve her community in ways too numerous to name. Some of the most notable are: founder of Making Wellston Beautiful, member of Jackson County Economic Development Council, member Ohio Means Jobs Local Advisory Council, elder of First Presbyterian Church of Wellston, organizer of the Wellston National Women's Day of Prayer, member of Substance Abuse Prevention & Addiction Resource Council (SPARC), past president of Wellston Rotary, City of Wellston Treasurer and currently serving a second term as Mayor of Wellston.

Connie was honored as the Grand Marshal of the Grand Marshal of the 2017 Coal Festival Parade which caps a five-day community heritage celebration in the community she dearly loves.

Her Rotary involvement began about nine years ago and her "Rotary Moment" came shortly thereafter. "I was president-elect and my mentor, colleague and friend Dan Lockard, Jr. was president," she recalls tearfully. "He took me under his wing and showed me all the wonderful plans he had for Wellston Rotary. Six months into his presidency, he died. Upset as I was, I dug in and determined to accomplish all Dan's goals AND mine over the next 18 months."

She cites an array of Rotary functions as adding value to her beloved community: the Christmas concert, ROTARY show, pancake breakfast, golf tournament, Valentine dinner, club contributions to TLC ministries, scholarships, Coal festival, toy drives as well as other voluntary and financial contributions to other civic organizations and programs.

Today, Connie shares her spotlight and passion for community with husband John, five children and 12 grandchildren. No doubt she'll be an inspiration for generations to come.





Key Events in the Evolution of the Rotary Foundation

ARCH KLUMPH'S VISION — 1917

It seems eminently proper that we should accept endowments for the purpose of doing good in the world, in charitable, educational or other avenues of community progress ...

- Arch Klumph, 1917




At the 1917 Convention in Atlanta, Georgia, outgoing Rotary president Arch Klumph proposed setting up an endowment "for the purpose of doing good in the world." That one idea, and an initial contribution of \$26.50—made by the Rotary Club of Kansas City, Missouri-set in motion a powerful force that has transformed millions of lives around the world.

- When Rotary President Paul Harris died, Rotary sent its members a telegram telling them of his desire: to make a contribution to the Foundation in lieu of flowers. Rotary members around the world responded, resulting in a \$1.3 million donation to the Rotary Foundation in his memory.
- The Paul Harris Fellow recognition began in the 1950s, acknowledging contributions to the Foundation of \$1,000. In 2006, the number of Paul Harris Fellows reached 1 million.
- Rotary began immunizing six million children in the Philippines against polio in the 1979. The PolioPlus program launched in 1985. Over the next several years, the campaign raised \$247 million to work toward a worldwide eradication
