Worldwide impact in snapshots A MESSAGE FROM THE ROTARY INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT



Imagine if we could take a snapshot capturing all of the work Rotary does on a given day. No one – except Rotarians – would believe that a single organization was capable of accomplishing so much. In that snapshot you would see dedicated volunteers working to eradicate polio, setting up microloans, providing clean water, mentoring youth, and countless other actions.

We can do all this thanks both to our geographic reach and to the fact that our clubs are made up of people who are engaged in their communities. As a part of the community that you serve, you know the needs, you have the connections, and you're able to take immediate action. That's why every Rotary club's

membership should reflect the diversity of its community.

We've made great strides in this. In Egypt, Indonesia, and Kenya, Rotary is approaching 50 percent female membership. We're also expanding the age diversity of our clubs. In each of our communities, young professionals are eager to contribute their talents, give back, and learn from mentors. Let's share with them what Rotary is all about. The Engaging Younger Professionals Toolkit at Rotary.org has an action plan to help you reach young leaders and Rotary alumni in your area.

Another resource that can help us better reflect our communities – one that is global like us, is a quarter-million members strong, and already shares our values of service and leadership – is Rotaract. Rotaractors are our partners: Team up with them on projects, ask them to speak at your events, and invite them to join your club. Rotary New Generation Exchange

District 6690 has been participating in New Generations Exchanges since 2013 with our first incoming student, Shoko, from Japan. This exchange is for young adults in college or those who have recently graduated. The key to the exchange is vocational, service and cultural involvement. Most students participating have previously been involved in one of the Rotary Youth Programs.

Rotarian Spotlight: **Spencer Barker** NEWARK-HEATH ROTARY



A Spotlight? Spencer Barker deserves thousands of shimmering lights. As president of the board of directors for the Licking County Courthouse Lighting Committee, he plays in integral role in perpetuating holiday and commemorative courthouse lighting displays that have delighted this community for generations. It's a labor of love, following in his late-father's

(John C. "Jay" Barker) footsteps.

Born and raised in the county, Spencer graduated from Granville High School and The Ohio State University. Then Spencer expanded his resume by attending the Ohio Auction School to become a State of Ohio Licensed Auctioneer followed by licensure as a Real Estate Agent.

Today this fast-talking sales expert owns both a local marketing agency, Elite Marketing and iSAB Video Productions. Spencer also is a Community Manager for NEWORK Space in Downtown Newark, a privately held coworking space. Spencer's involvement with the Newark-Heath Rotary extends back to his high school days when his father brought him along as a guest to club meetings. Spencer took the mission to heart, becoming Rotaract President at OSU/Newark. After his dad's passing in 2014, Spencer took the vacant Newark-Heath board seat and today he is serving as President. Spencer's Rotary Moment came shortly after joining the board and participating in the Club's dictionary distribution mission.

"The impact we had on those kids - seeing the appreciation on their faces - it meant everything to them and to me, "says Spencer. "Yes, it's a print dictionary to kids living in a digital world, but to them it was very valuable."

Always plugged in to the needs of his community, Spencer attends Second Presbyterian Church in Downtown Newark and sits on the governing board of the church. He is a board member of The LICCO Supporting Foundation, and a member the Licking County Republican Party Executive Committee. He is also an active member of the Young Leaders of Licking County.





Although it currently circulates in only a few countries, polio is highly infectious and spreads rapidly. The disease, which afflicts mainly children, is transmitted via contaminated water and food supplies. Five to 10 percent of cases are fatal. As long as polio threatens even one child anywhere in the world, children everywhere are at risk. Only the global eradication of polio will ensure that no child ever again suffers its devastating effects.

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

- If polio is not eradicated, within 10 years, as many as 200,000 children will be paralyzed by it each year.
- In 2017, more than 430 million children were vaccinated multiple times using more than two billion doses of oral polio vaccine. This will be done every year until the world is certified polio free. Rotary funds will help do this.
- To date, 122 countries have benefited from PolioPlus grants.
- Since 1988, the number of polio endemic countries declined from over 125 to three.
- In 2017, under an expanded partnership with the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, every \$1 Rotary commits to polio eradication will be matched 2-to-1 (up to \$ 50 million per year) through 2020.

On average, a child can be fully protected against polio for US\$3.

Since 1998, Vitamin A supplements have been added to polio immunization activities, helping to avert an estimated 1.5 million childhood deaths.

A study published in 2010 in the medical journal "Vaccine" estimates the economic benefit of polio eradication as US\$40-50 billion.

FUNDING

- From 2013 until the certification of eradication, an estimated US\$7 billion in donor contributions is needed to fully implement the activities of the Polio Eradication and Endgame Strategic Plan.
- By the time the world is certified polio-free, Rotary's contributions to the global polio eradication effort will exceed US\$2.2 billion, including over US\$985 million in matching funds from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation.
- Rotary's contribution to the GPEI since 1988 accounts for nearly 14% of all contributions through June 2017 and approximately 42% of private sector giving.

Select PolioPlus Grant Projects Funded in 2018

- 1. DR Congo: 300,00 information, education and communication materials (posters) as well as 751 broadcasting messages by community based media during National Immunization Days.
- 2. Afghanistan: Allowance and training for 125,014 vaccinators during one National Immunization Day and one Sub-National Immunization Day.
- 3. Pakistan: Allowance and training for 310,229 vaccinators during one National Immunization Day and one Sub-National Immunization Day.
- 4. Cameroon: Organization of a micro-plan workshop, 800 post-round evaluation meetings, and cross-border activities for one National Immunization Day.

What is circulating vaccine-derived virus?

In populations with low-immunization coverage, it is possible for the weakened virus used in the oral vaccine to circulate in the environment long enough to undergo genetic changes that can cause paralysis. This is called vaccine derived poliovirus and is tracked separately than cases of wild poliovirus. When a population if fully immunized, they will be protected against both vaccine derived and wild polioviruses.
