Colleen Bonadonna is the current District 7600 Polio Plus Chair. She has led and / or participated in Rotary service projects across the globe and in her local community. In Nigeria and India, she led or participated in 12 National Immunization Days (NID). In the latter, she participated in projects for maternal and child's health, education, economic development, and water & sanitation. In Honduras, she supported work at both an ophthalmic clinic (2015) and as part of a maternal health project (2017). In Kenya, she worked with the Cheery Education Center (2019). In Ghana, she participated in water and sanitation projects funded by a Rotary Global Grant. As the Chair of the Polio Plus Program, she visited 200 clubs in 200 days to promote the 200 Million Dollar Gates Foundation challenge to eradicate Polio. Her commitment to eradicating polio can be visibly seen on her person as she carries with her a purple pinkie, the symbol for a completed vaccination, and a tattoo of two drops, the recognized symbol for the two-dose vaccine series. Recently, she served as the host and moderator of the 2020 World Polio Day Telethon. As a leading Rotarian, she is the recipient of the Rotary International's Regional Service Award for a Polio-Free World, The Rotary Foundation District Service Award, Club Builder Award (7610), and Innovation Award (7600).
