Possible Objections to going abroad

- Language Concerns: Language courses here & camps abroad. Students with no language skill and those with much exposure are about even in language ability 3-4 Months into the Exchange.
- Fear of being out of synch with your class A global perspective, college competitiveness and high level career opportunities more than make up for this. (Point out that with good planning, that year may not need to be made up.) (Steve should address this)
- Not wanting to be away from friends A year after graduating, you will have lost contact with most of your friends. A year abroad will gain you international friends that will last a lifetime.
- Being without Americana and its culture, music, movies and clothes A good trade off is: Gaining self confidence, a global perspective, language competence, college competitiveness, high-level career opportunities, broad education, political insights, new friends, while having the time of your life is a good trade-off.
