## **Ukraine: A Bastion of Democracy**

The talk this week offered us a carefully phrased, official view of the war in Ukraine and now also on Russian territory. When the dramatic invasion began in February 2023, newspapers in the USA would headline the number of days of combat. That's over. Consul Kushneruk began by reminding us that Russians first took Ukrainian territory back in 2008 with the invasion of Crimea. In response to a question at the end, the Consul also reminded us that though there might be a ceasefire, Ukraine would never describe anything as "peace†until all the occupied land was

returned. The tally presented of Russian casualties, downed aircraft, mangled tanks, and other Ukrainian successes was, sadly, also a reminder of how much Putin is prepared to exhaust his supplies and his people in pursuit of what he defines as victory in this terrible war.

The Consul's talk was intended not only as a strategic update, though he was clearly proud of the success of Ukraine's small counter-invasion into Russian territory. He also spoke explicitly of Ukraine's aspirations in relation to Europe and the USA. Why prevent Ukraine from using its powerful U.S.-donated weapons in attacking Russian territory? Surely this war is enough to prove that Putin will not hold back if he chooses not to. The West should remain steadfast in punishing the perpetrators of Russia's war crimes.

In the U.S. election coming up, one possible result is that our official solidarity with Ukraine and our commitments to provide more weapons will weaken dramatically. The Consul, of course, hopes for a unified U.S. response to the war, but he was skillful in reminding us that Ukraine too has a stake in the outcome in November.
