

### **Healing Our Divides**

The Berkeley Rotary Peace Committee, along with the Albany Rotary, hosted a workshop called *Healing Our Divides* at Northbrae Church, Berkeley, on Saturday, October 5.

The workshop was led by Courageous Leadership LLC and its CEO Brooke Deterline, daughter of Austin and Lynne Henderson of our club. Brooke has led previous trainings in our club and in our District and multi-district conferences. This small training, inspired by Anne Pardee, was a preview of one that we hope to conduct, District-wide and multi-district-wide, in February. The 35 attendees were more than we had anticipated; some were members of Northbrae Church.

Survey results of the training were quite positive. Respondents had an increase in their sense of efficacy to bridge divides, in how much they value listening with empathy to people who think differently, and in their sense of belonging.

One quote from a participant: "Initially, when I began speaking into the shared values, I thought I was doing it only for her (my sister's) benefit, but found myself reconnecting to those values too — and feeling immensely moved by that. Going into the exercise, I thought I would end up relitigating why I'd been right in my perspective, but the exercise took me in a totally different direction and opened up so much possibility for peace between my sister and me. It was a truly transformational experience."

We look forward to more.

### Welcome, Dr. Denise Richardson!

On October 9, the club was pleased and honored to induct Dr. Denise Richardson, President of Berkeley City College (BCC), as a new club member. Her career in the Peralta Community College District has spanned over two decades, marked by continuous growth and leadership. Starting as a faculty member at Laney College in Oakland in 2001, she progressed through various roles including Political Science instructor, Social Sciences Department Chair, and Dean of Math and Sciences.

Dr. Richardson earned her Doctorate in Educational Leadership at Mills College where she wrote a narrative dissertation that examined success strategies of Black American males who completed STEM degree programs at California Bay Area community colleges. She

also holds an M.A. Degree in Educational Leadership from Mills, an M.A. Degree in Political Science from San Francisco State University, and a B.A. in Communication from Oakwood University [a Historically Black College] in Huntsville, AL.

In March 2020, Dr. Richardson became Vice President of Instruction at Merritt College. Her expertise and dedication led to her appointment as Interim President of Berkeley City College (BCC) on July 1, 2023. In October 2023, she was named the permanent President of BCC. This appointment recognizes her long-standing commitment to education and her effective leadership within the Peralta Community College District.

You may have heard Denise speak for a few moments at the August Berkeley Rotary

Meeting where we celebrated our Community Scholars. She revealed a few interesting facts about her life and her motivations. She moved to the Bay Area from Connecticut about 40 years ago, and after a career in advertising decided she wanted to do something that really had an impact. She found that with the community colleges—where, as noted, she made quite an impact. She loves the way the community colleges are not just a first option, but a place for people to find a 2<sup>nd</sup> or 3<sup>rd</sup> option for success. (And at just \$46 a credit!) Her three children groaned when she urged them to start at the community college level, saying "No Mom, that's your thing," but her third child did start there, and made a very successful transfer to UC Berkeley.

Dr. Denise Richardson is bringing a lot to Berkeley Rotary, and we hope we can support her and involve her successfully in this community.

He also gave the Rotaracters tips for successful community organizing. A good exchange of questions and answers followed.

In addition to Doug's talk, the Rotarians who attended learned of the many service and social events recently held or upcoming for Rotaracters. We learned of the current teams in Rotaract named "the Pardees" and the "Oscar Lunas." Current membership is up from last year and still growing, from 25-35 last year to 50-60 applications submitted so far this year.

## George Luna Preschool Classrooms: History of a Project

The George Luna Preschool Classroom project evolved through a somewhat circuitous process. The club's Health and Wellbeing Committee was working on building a children's dental clinic with the YMCA of the East Bay at the EM Downer Early Learning Center in Richmond. We received a district grant on this proposal.

In the meantime, our cherished member, George Luna, had a tragic and untimely death. Donations in his honor were solicited to commemorate his memory in some way. These two events came together and the Y was approached for naming rights of the evolving project. This was granted, so we could name the project in honor of George. Other clubs were approached to support this project.

The finances looked like this:

- 1. 25 individual donors = \$7950
- 2. Richmond, Pinole, Albany, and Hercules Rotary Clubs = \$2,000
- 3. Berkeley Rotary club grant = \$500
- 4. District grant = \$14,500

Total = \$24,950, which was close to half of the total project cost of \$60,000.

So far, so good. But then life intervened. The pediatric dental clinic project had to be shelved. Here we were with all this money. Somewhat painful discussions occurred and disappointments worked through. But, like the phoenix rising from the ashes, a new and equally fitting project to honor George's commitment to youth emerged: the construction of two preschool classrooms.

With Grier's legerdemain in managing grants, the District was sold on switching the already awarded grant to this new project, not an easy thing to do.

We held a day of hands-on work helping to finish the project. A commemorative plaque was ordered in George's honor.
