A Heartwarming Horror Story

Who would have thought that scaring people for a living could bring you the affection, admiration, and warm embrace of a passionate community of fans? At our last meeting, Tommy Lee Wallace described his seminal career in the horror film business with a mixture of humor, humility, and appreciation at how this seemingly "niche" genre became his life's work.

Tommy Lee collaborated with John Carpenter on the first *Halloween* movie in 1978. This film was produced on a shoestring budget of \$300,000 and ended up grossing over \$50 million and counting. It was difficult shooting the film in Los Angeles in the middle of April when it was supposed to be happening in a small midwestern town on October 31. Accomplishing this involved painting Mexican gourds orange to look like pumpkins and re-using 3 garbage bags of "fall" leaves over and over. They made it all work, though.

Although it was difficult at the time, Tommy Lee turned down the offer to direct the *Halloween 2* sequel because the script was too gory. He doesn't like the trend in current thriller/horror movies towards more and more graphic violence. The best films of the genre work towards building suspense and letting the audience use its imagination as to any violent events. Alfred Hitchcock was a master at this.

Although Tommy Lee turned down directing *Halloween 2*, he went on to direct 25 other horror/thriller/suspense films and TV shows, including episodes of the Twilight Zone and Stephen King's horror movie, *It.* In recent years, he has been featured at "Horror Cons" (conventions), both nationally and internationally, and just returned from one in Manchester, England that was attended by thousands of fans. He wasn't sure

about doing this until he was told that "people are going to come up to you to tell you what a genius you are, and then they're going to give you money." He acquiesced. He has been moved and gratified by talking to hundreds of enthusiastic and knowledgeable fans of his work at these events and hearing how meaningful his work has been to them.




From the Club Archives: Rotaract Then and Now
