Last week, Tina and I presented the state of the Endowment and recognition of our financial donors. A special thank you was extended to all who gave time and talent, acknowledging that our many projects would not have been possible without the many hands of our club members.

The Endowment is in good shape. Our total of \$1,168,000 includes a corpus of \$816,000 and is up 4.2% from last year. The goal of the Endowment is to reach \$1,000,000 and then begin spending the income. This will allow us to expand our grants and scholarships.

The Ted Ockels Society, much like the Paul Harris Society for Rotary International, was created to recognize the importance of financial support to the

Berkeley Rotary Endowment, motivating others to participate. This recognition is our way of saying thank you from all of Berkeley Rotary and the beneficiaries of our grants and projects. This is the Rotaractors' biggest project every year, so thanks, Berkeley Rotary, for making it possible.




