Program: Gamble House, Tom Volz

Tom Shelly introduced our guest speaker to talk about the Gamble House in Pasadena. Tom Volz is a retired project manager and engineer from Parsons, and has been a docent at the Gamble House in Pasadena since 2009. He is a member of the Gamble House Speakers' Bureau.

Charles Greene and Henry Greene designed and built the

home, having come to CA in 1894 after studying architecture at MIT. Gamble House was built for and funded by David B. and Mary Gamble. Both were very involved in the design of the house. The style is Craftsman Bungalow, including bold timberwork, broad overhanging eaves, expansive porches, sleeping porches, natural landscaping; and beautiful and purposeful interior elements. House is 6,000 square feet not including the three sleeping porches.

Tom highlighted features inside the Gamble House:

- The house was constructed in 10 months using 20 workmen on any given day. Woodwork was constructed onsite.
- Remarkable for its time, the house was wired for electricity and had bathrooms for each bedroom.
- The front door embeds "art glass" trees and is very iconic and unique. (Art Glass is distinct from stained glass.) The door also provides cross ventilation to back door for health reasons. (See photos below)
- All the furniture was designed for the house by or for the Greenes, carrying through design elements from the windows to chairs and headboards and the like.
 Inlay details in the wood use materials such as abalone and ebony in patterns with Asian influence.
- The dining table was custom designed for Green and Greene for the house by the Hall brothers of Pasadena. It has five leaves, with a cabinet all their own.
- The kitchen floor has a type of linoleum tile recently put in over the maple overlayment that was exposed for many years, to restore the original look. Sugar pine is on all countertops.
- The stairway exaggerates each joint, highlighting the exceptional, functional design and craftsmanship.

Gamble House, Cont'd

- The living room has a trussed ceiling of natural wood over the fireplace.
- Fireplace detail includes mosaic of climbing rose undulating across the tile. The climbing rose is from the Gamble family crest.
- The first floor guest room is themed in silver, including climbing rose theme inlays, on the mirror, writing desk, beds, and chests.
 In the early 1920's twin beds were popular, including in the master bedroom.
- The Gambles' Aunt Julia lived there too and wicker furniture
 was designed just for her. She made a special request for a
 Franklin stove instead of a fireplace, and a dining room chair
 and stool that accounted for her small stature.
- The attic was originally set up for storage, but has conference tables for training docents or may be used by public groups.
- Other rooms include David Gamble's den with a magnificent brick woodburning fireplace. Other fireplaces had special ceramic stones that held heat generated by gas.
- Outdoors, the Greenes made extensive use of natural elements: stone pathways, stone walls, etc.

Tom noted that various In-depth special tours and regular tours of the house are available. <u>Visit!</u> (Your editor and Bernadette Kendall did so on Tuesday — sort of a makeup, and took pictures.) See more pictures on the <u>Gamble House website</u> and others dedicated to the Craftsman style. This home is a beautiful work of art!
