Signs of overdose (From the CDC)

Recognizing the signs of opioid overdose can save a life. Here are some things to look for:

- Small, constricted "pinpoint pupils"
- Falling asleep or losing consciousness
- Slow, weak, or no breathing
- Choking or gurgling sounds
- Limp body
- Cold and/or clammy skin
- Discolored skin (especially in lips and nails)

What to do if you think someone is overdosing

It may be hard to tell whether a person is high or experiencing an overdose. If you aren't sure, treat it like an overdose—you could save a life.

- Call 911 Immediately.
- Administer naloxone, if available.
- **\(\pi \)**

Try to keep the person awake and breathing.

- Lay the person on their side to prevent choking.
- Stay with the person until emergency assistance arrives.

^{*}Most states have laws that may protect a person who is overdosing or the person who called for help from legal trouble.

^{**} Naloxone is a life-saving medication that can reverse the effects of opioid overdose and save lives. It is available in all 50 states and can be purchased from a local pharmacy without a prescrition in most states.
