Additionally, he oversees the LAU branch campus in New York which further solidifies his global vision.

In his very interesting and candid talk, Dr. Badr shared with us facts about LAU and his work. Of particular interest is the newly formed Industrial Hub to provide internships for students while studying.

31 companies signed up in the areas of Engineering, IT, Digital Transformation. He managed to mobilize help from Europe for SME's dealing with solar energy and branding. The speaker shared pictures of the Industrial Hub which is very impressive and will certainly prove to be an asset for the students.

Presentation Topic

"Quantum Leadership: Transforming Teams with heart, Courage and Empathy, through transparency" Introduced by PP Joe Boulos, Coach Mike treated us to a comprehensive and very informative session on leadership. The speaker is well known on the international coaching circuit and is the author of Executive Powers.

What is Quantum Leadership? As described by the speaker, Quantum leadership embraces interconnectedness, empathy, and transparency. It focuses on leading with heart and openness, understanding that every decision impacts the organization as a whole. Organizations that do not invest in leadership create a lost opportunity for excellence. And people do not leave companies, they leave bad bosses and leaders. He goes on to say that empathy is at the core of Quantum leadership; it's the driving force that builds trust and strong team work.

Another important element is the power of transparency in leadership. In his words "Transparency means being open, honest, and clear about decisions and intentions. It creates trust and fosters an environment where people feel safe to share ideas and feedback". The speaker gave examples about people leading with Empath and transparency: The New Zealand Prime Minister Jacinda Ardern when she connected with victims after Christ Church attacks; Nelson Mandela who called for reconciliation and empathy during South Africa's transition; Richard Branson who built a people-first culture, focusing on employees' well being to name a few. Mike delved more in depth on how to build empathy as a leader, how to use transparency to build trust and how empathy drives team performance.


September Events

RCBC Attends Urgent Meeting of Rotary Disaster Relief (RDR)

In response to the escalating situation in Lebanon, the Rotary Disaster Relief (RDR) initiative was urgently established. As part of Rotary's core mission of social support, we immediately mobilized to contribute and assist.

The meeting included representatives from all Rotary Clubs, as well as Rotaract, and we collectively agreed to divide our activities into different categories, as follows:

1.Onsite Needs Assessment:

Some clubs are conducting onsite assessments to evaluate the needs of displaced individuals. Based on these assessments, they either purchase necessary materials (such as water tanks, hygiene supplies, mattresses, etc.) directly or request support from the RDR for further supply of required items.

2.Immediate Financial Support:

Clubs adopting this approach, but without immediate access to funds, are personally covering costs and subsequently reimbursing them from the RDR upon submission of official invoices.

3.Remote Contribution:

Clubs unable to perform onsite assessments are leveraging their networks to source and donate listed items. These materials are then sent to the RDR for distribution to urgent locations, such as schools.

All Rotary clubs in Lebanon are working jointly, consolidating their efforts to provide a concentrated response, supporting and assisting displaced individuals across all regions of Lebanon.



Decline In Attendance: Solutions from Rotarian Experts

As a global service organization, Rotary derives its strength from its members. Increasing membership, retaining members, and keeping members engaged are at the forefront of every Rotary Club's agenda at the international and local levels. Yet, the decline in regular attendance at club meetings has become a challenge in maintaining clubs' momentum and impact.



To help us understand our challenges and navigate our way forward, Rotary Metn Gate reached out to Past President Mona Jarudi, RC Beirut Cosmopolitan, Country Membership Chair (2020-23), and PDG Bashar Haddad District 2452 to share some insights on why attendance is dropping and possible strategies that can help address this challenge.

In general, the drop in attendance can be attributed to a lack of interest, financial obligations, job commitments, timing of meetings and location, etc. Here are some suggestions by PP. Mona and PDG Bashar to address the decline in attendance and hints to increase, retain, and keep members engaged.



HAVE A MEMBERSHIP CHAIR

Maintaining strong membership records is not easy work. It requires time, effort, and lots of follow-up. Clubs with low membership levels spend more time recruiting and vetting new members, and clubs with solid membership levels spend more time training and guiding existing members. This is why having a Membership Chair fully dedicated to membership recruitment, training, and retention becomes necessary.

According to Past President Mona Jarudi, RC Beirut Cosmopolitan, and Country Membership Chair 2020-2023, "Every club should have a membership chair. This chair should be supported and empowered by the president and the board to address membership satisfaction and challenges". The chair should have a plan to be followed throughout the year with one goal: boosting the numbers and quality of members. In turn, this supports the club's overall performance and future.

USE ROTARY TOOLS, GIVE MEMBERS A VOICE

Rotary International provides a wealth of support to the club and the Membership Chair. Membership Satisfaction Surveys, Club Health Check, and others are examples. "These tools allow every member to voice their opinion about the club, its operations, projects they like to see implemented, fellowship, etc," says PP. Jarudi adds that these shared opinions help pinpoint underlying issues and tailor solutions accordingly. "A member is a stakeholder in the club, and every member's opinion is valuable," she says. After all, if members are unhappy, they may not express it bluntly. They may keep it to themselves and leave in silence.

For PDG Bashar Haddad, membership surveys or simple feedback sessions help the President and the board gain insights into the reasons behind members' absenteeism. "This understanding can help pinpoint underlying issues and tailor solutions accordingly."

Rotary Club Beirut Cosmopolitan Response for the Rotary Disaster Relief

In a beehive of activity, every club in Lebanon chose its path to respond to the disaster that befell the country. From providing basic necessities to dealing with water purification for the 1.2 million displaced people, to providing sanitation and hot water, Rotarians responded with intent and focus.

Our club responded with the following:

- 1. Through a private donor, 14 mattresses were donated to a school in Bawaerta.
- 2. A private donation to Dar Onboz to provide books for children in schools. The books were housed in boxes with wheels to allow for many people to use them. Below is the picture of the first librarian, Nisrine , 17 years old from Ain Qana, currently displaced to Lycee Abdul Qader.
- 3. RCBC participated in a major donation organized by RC Metn Gate to send food and sanitary products to Rmeish, a village in South Lebanon whose residents refused to leave their homes, risking their lives under continuous bombardment. 13 tons were transported to the village by Lebanese army trucks as they were the only ones capable of crossing the bombed roads.
- 4. A Global Grant is under consideration to help the Karantina Government Hospital with much needed equipment.
- 5. Rotary Club Beirut Cosmopolitan is in the process of helping the Lebanese Red Cross with needed medications for the disaster relief efforts.
