Rotary's Growth (cont)


- 1916 Truly Global
- 1921 Clubs in Europe, South & Central America, Australia, Africa, and Asia.
- 1922 the name "Rotary International" adopted
- 1925 200 clubs with over 20,000 members

Rotary District 6170

Object Of Rotary

To encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster:

- *Development of Acquaintance
- *High Ethical Standards in business and professions
- *Application to his/her personal, business and community life
- *Advancement of International understanding, good will and peace



Five Avenues of Service

Club Service: focuses on making clubs strong. A thriving club is anchored by strong relationships and an active membership development plan.

Vocational Service: Vocational Service calls on every Rotarian to work with integrity and contribute their expertise to the problems and needs of society.

Community Service: encourages every Rotarian to find ways to improve the quality of life for people in their communities and to serve the public interest.



Five Avenues of Service

International Service: exemplifies our global reach in promoting peace and understanding. We support this service avenue by sponsoring or volunteering on international projects, seeking partners abroad, and more.

Youth Service: recognizes the importance of empowering youth and young professionals through leadership development programs such as Rotaract, Interact, Rotary Youth Leadership Awards, and Rotary Youth Exchange

Promoting Peace

Rotary encourages conversations to foster understanding within and across cultures. We train adults and young leaders to prevent & mediate conflict and help refugees who have fled dangerous areas.

Fighting Disease

We educate and equip communities to stop the spread of lifethreatening diseases like polio, HIV/AIDS, and malaria. We improve and expand access to low-cost and free health care in developing areas.

Providing Clean water, sanitation, and hygiene

We support local solutions to bring clean water, sanitation, and hygiene to more people every day. We don't just build wells and walk away. We share our expertise with community leaders and educators to make sure our projects succeed long-term.



Rotary Foundation Causes

Saving mothers and children

Nearly 6 million children under the age of five die each year because of malnutrition, poor health care, and inadequate sanitation. We expand access to quality care, so mothers and their children can live and grow stronger.

Supporting Education

More than 775 million people over the age of 15 are illiterate. Our goal is to strengthen the capacity of communities to support basic education and literacy, reduce gender disparity in education, and increase adult literacy.

Growing local economies

We carry out service projects that enhance economic and community development and create opportunities for decent and productive work for young and old. We also strengthen local entrepreneurs and community leaders, particularly women, in impoverished communities.


