

The Art of Murphy Darden, Sr.

The Art of Murphy Darden, Sr. will be exhibited in the Westin Gallery from, Tuesday, February 4 through February 21, 2025. Stop in to see the work of a Kalamazoo legend Tuesday – Fridays 9:00 am – 6:00 pm with an opening reception Friday, January 31, 5:00-7:00 pm. Art will be on sale at the exhibit and proceeds will go to benefit grants programs of the Arts Council. Born in 1928 in the Deep South, Murphy Darden, Sr. was what is sometimes called an "outsider artist," one who has come up outside the traditional art world. He was self-taught, learning

about art by drawing as a kid with his twin brother, Irvin. Always on a limited income, he used materials he had at hand. Murphy was creating and always working on some artistic pursuit or other, right up until he died. The lifelong mission of Murphy Darden, Sr. was to educate us about the cruelty of slavery and discrimination and to celebrate what African Americans were able to achieve in the face of overwhelming odds. He believed in telling the truth about Black History so that it would never happen again. He used his passion as an artist and black historian to educate. He spoke out against the injustices of slavery and the unfairness of discrimination that occurred from the post-Civil War period up to the Civil Rights Movement of the 1960s. He believed in telling Black History – the truth of it – as it was and proclaiming the rights gained during the Civil Rights Movement to protect those rights into the future.
