

Dengue

With more than one-third of the world's population living in areas at risk for infection, dengue virus is a leading cause of illness and death in the tropics and subtropics. As many as 400 million people are infected yearly. Dengue is caused by any one of four related viruses transmitted by mosquitoes. There are not yet any vaccines to prevent infection with dengue virus and the most effective protective measures are those that avoid mosquito bites. When infected, early recognition and prompt supportive treatment can substantially lower the risk of medical complications and death.

Dengue has emerged as a worldwide problem only since the 1950s. Although dengue rarely occurs in the continental United States, it is endemic in Puerto Rico and in many popular tourist destinations in Latin America, Southeast Asia and the Pacific islands

Infections transmitted by the Aedes mosquito have spread significantly in Colombia, including dengue fever, chikungunya and Zika virus.

The Instituto Nacional de Salud, or the Colombia National Institutes of Health released the following data on the disease.

Dengue fever

Through epidemiological week 44 of 2015, the Public Health Surveillance System (SIVIGILA) has reported 78,123 dengue cases; 77,086 cases (98.7%) of dengue and 1037 cases (1.3%) severe dengue. 51% of severe dengue cases occurred in children under 14 years.

An average of 1,775 dengue cases a week have been reported.


81% of dengue cases came from 12 states with Valle del Cauca and Santander seeing the most. Sixty-one dengue fatalities have been reported with Tolima department reporting the most (18).

Budget thoughts

Objective is to run a Pilot Project as a District supported Grant to fight the *Aedes aegypti* and *Aedes albopictus* - the mosquitos that spread arboviruses (dengue, chikungunya & zika viruses) using insecticide treated curtains.

Financing as of April 2016

Rotary Clubs in Kalamazoo area – \$2,000 Rotary 6360 District -\$2,000 Rotary Club of Armenia \$1,000 District in Colombia \$1,000

Total - \$4,000

The Rotary Club of Armenia proposes to include 600 households in this pilot study. Part of the budget should be reserved

for transportation and delivery of the curtains.

\$24,000 will buy curtains for around 6 00 households: Each house has 4 windows & 2 doors.

Using 2014 Best Net pricing:

4 x \$3.70 windows = \$14.80 2 x \$3.55 doors = \$7.10

Total = \$21.90 per house. At present a rough estimate of \$40.00/ household is more possible.

We spoke about the need for a Public Health work on the ground to reduce mosquito-breeding sights but it is clear that, at least for the next months as Zika virus is big news, local governments all over Latin America, including Colombia, will undertake both public education and some spraying. What they won't do is deploy impregnated curtains so that's where I advocate spending the Pilot Project money.

During the Pilot Project we can assess the need and the opportunity for participation in these programs that are essentially part of the work of the local Ministerio de Salud.

If we are able to raise more money, this budget could be the template for making the project proportionately bigger. It is fair to say to potential donors that each \$20 US protects a house and its inhabitants
