With a new Rotary year comes the familiar commitments from our district to punch harder against barriers to membership. In her July 26 address to our Club, District Governor **Rachel Ossyra** invoked Rotary founder **Paul Harris**, urging us to "be revolutionary at all times." And in keeping with this year's theme – "The Magic of Rotary" – "to use our magic to grow and share Rotary...to be simply irresistible."

District 6450 has "committed to increasing our membership by a net 100 by next July 1;" no easy task, Ossyra said, in view of the North American trend toward shrinking Rotary involvement.

Governor Ossyra praised our Club, saying we are fully engaged in the community doing "good work." But we can't stop there. "We have to be willing to try new things...even start a new club - a cardinal goal of R.I. That could include a satellite or Rotaract club.

The Governor is excited about a new "gold membership" plan being rolled out by our District this month. The concept, already tried recently by other clubs, marshals the tools, resources, and activities needed to build and strengthen club membership and enhance retention. Among its components:

- Complete a short survey to find out what members are interested in and get feedback.
- Have an engagement activity that supports service, leadership, personal growth, or networking (we have that covered in spades).
- Schedule a District membership team presentation.

Governor Ossyra added two additional goals on the District menu: engage our global humanitarian network to do good in the world (such as our plastic recycling project in India), and in your strategic plan or vision, "put people at the center of everything you do."

Making Room at Little Friends

Little Friends is working with the Department of Children and Family Services to establish two residential homes for children needing outside home support. Writing in <u>Positively Naperville</u>, Little Friends CEO **Mike Briggs**, said each new home will accommodate six special needs children. But that's not enough: "The needs far (surpass) what we are going to be able to do."

Briggs painted a bleak picture of the current situation, in which children are having to be placed at far-off locations away from family and adequate support. "In total," he said, "approximately 200 children are in residential care in the state, with several children who, because of limited resources, are placed in other locations outside the state. There continues to be demand for the work we do, and unfortunately that far outpaces the supply and resources available..."
