





District Governor Mike Martin

Hello, D6490!

It seems hardly possible the first two months of the 2024–2025 Rotary year have come and gone. As we bid a fond farewell to August, and September brings milder temperatures, fall foliage, and a change of seasons, I am reflecting on my official club visits and participation in Rotary events and activities during the last few weeks.

It's interesting to witness and experience—firsthand—the personality of each club. So far, I have attended D6490 club meetings in a coffee shop, public libraries, American Legion Halls, college campuses, a brewery, office buildings, a train terminal, churches, and a community center.

Some of our clubs are traditional; others are more modern. Some club members gather weekly at their regular location, day, and time. Some have other arrangements, such as coming together only twice a month (one traditional meeting and another solely for projects). Most of our fellow D6490 Rotarians meet in a regular location. Other clubs rotate locations—like Paul Harris and the original "Big 4."

When I consider how, when, and where D6490 clubs meet, a couple of things come to mind. First, for most, the way members meet today is the way members have met since the club was chartered. While many clubs have changed their meeting location, time, and the day they meet, or the number of monthly meetings, the meeting format has generally remained the same. Why?

In the United States, Rotary clubs were generally chartered to accommodate a specific group of people.

Initially, it was Caucasian male professionals, executives, business owners, and other influential men who had the resources and flexibility to manage their time—which enabled them to meet regularly on a particular day of the week. Seldom were bluecollar workers (service professionals, mid-level managers, or others in similar professional roles), women or minorities, included because they did not meet the criteria for Rotary club membership.

In the 1980s–1990s, the demographics of Rotary began to change as clubs began expanding membership by recruiting women and people of color. S

However, despite opportunities for more diverse club membership, when potential members considered joining, many were unable to gather for Rotary meetings during the weekday lunch hour. Some prospective members were unable to commit to breakfast or afterhours club meetings due to family or other obligations. And not everyone has the resources to sustain the time and financial commitments of Rotary membership.

Today, as expressed through our international commitment to diversity, equity and inclusion: "We understand that cultivating a diverse, equitable, and inclusive culture is essential to realizing our vision of a world where people unite and take action to create lasting change."

As we move forward together, it is critical that D6490 Rotary clubs expand our ability to cultivate a diverse, equitable, and inclusive culture to attract, support, and unite our clubs and members. What can help us do that?




Basket Auction for PolioPlus

Volunteers Learn To Administer Life-Saving Drug, Train Others Too

SAVOY — Future naloxone- use trainers were made Thursday evening, as Rotarians and community leaders came together to learn not only how to administer the life-saving drug but also how to teach others to do so.

"The Rotary Club is the boots on the ground, so we need to come train them on doing the naloxone training," said Larry Kenemore, North America Task Force Leader for Rotary Action Group Addiction Prevention. "We don't want to keep coming back here, and it's their community, so we're going to train these trainers that are going to continue holding classes."

Naloxone has become a common addition to emergency medical kits for its ability to reverse the effects of an opioid overdose.

It can be easily administered by nonmedical professionals and has no ill effects if given to someone who is not undergoing an overdose.

Champaign County Coroner Steve Thuney has already had his staff undergo training for naloxone, and now he'll be learning how to continue passing on that information to others.

"We see the effects of overdose deaths all too often," Thuney said.

While numbers of those deaths have gone down over the last couple of years in Champaign County, Thuney said his history in the fire service and EMS has him wanting to get out and continue to help people.

"I see it as an opportunity to go and help in the prevention effort instead of just dealing with the death side of things," Thuney said. "I think it's a way for me to contribute to the community." Kenemore is making stops with multiple Rotary clubs around the area for naloxone training, which he said is part of the national Rotary's new mission since polio has been essentially eradicated.

"Project SMART" has five stages, including school/education, medication and drug disposal, awareness, recovery and treatment.

Most Rotary clubs just tackle a few aspects at a time, and "Awareness" including naloxone training, is a good place to start to quickly gain the potential to save lives.

Drugs like fentanyl and xylazine have called for multiple doses of naloxone, so Kenemore is training Rotarians to use a new medication called Kloxxado, which is at a higher strength and dosage than other options on the market.

"We believe it's going to take that amount to save somebody's life, and you only need to carry one dose on you," Kenemore said.

Since the drug has no major side effects, a dosage that is "too high" won't hurt someone.

Even so, Kenemore said people administering any kind of naloxone are protected by Illinois' Good Samaritan Act, which protects people from liability if they are trying to save a life.

And it's easy. "It's just a thing you carry in your pocket," Kenemore said. "You carry it in your pocket, open the packet, take it out, stick it in somebody's nose and push the button on the bottom. That's all you got to do."

While the new high-strength Kloxxado will be new to Thuney, he handled multiple overdose situations as a firefighter and has administered Narcan, another brand of naloxone. He said it may be important for people to have a few more bits of first-aid knowledge beyond the initial drug administration.

"In addition to trying to stop the opioids from affecting the brain, which causes you to stop breathing, we need to be able to provide them rescue breathing as well," Thuney said.

Thuney feels Rotary is on the right track with not only preventing overdose deaths, but providing education and encouraging addiction treatment.

He said he's looking forward to see how that goes locally.

"I'm excited to get on board and go out and help people prevent deaths so they don't have to call my office," Thuney said.
