RYLA Camp Scheduled April 4-6, 2025

RYLA Camp will be at the 4-H Camp at Allerton in Monticello for sophomores, juniors, and seniors from 4 p.m. Friday, April 4, to 1 p.m. Sunday, April 6 (please note this differs from the District Directory).

Registration fee for RYLA is \$165 per student. The fee is based on a goal of 80 students. If a club has an outbound or inbound Rotary Youth Exchange (RYE) student, they must attend. If a club sends a second non-student, the RYE student is free. If the RYE student is the only student, the club pays \$165.

If a club sent a sophomore last year, they return as a junior and pick a sophomore student for 2025. If a club sent a junior last year, they should return as a senior. First-year juniors and seniors will be accepted.

Sophomores will learn about their personality and how to work together as a team by utilizing the Colors Program and the University of Illinois (U of I) Challenge Course.

Juniors will learn business skills, participate in mock interviews with Rotarians and work as a team to build and race cardboard boats.

Seniors will learn skills to help them navigate college and life after high school. Students will learn to face their fears on the climbing wall (with assistance from professional U of I instructors.)

All students will learn from keynote speakers, group activities, and enjoy a night of games, dancing, bonfires, and camaraderie.

Please consider nominating shy, underserved, or overlooked students or students with disabilities who have not had the opportunity to become leaders.

RYLA Camp needs you! Rotarians are needed to recruit students to attend camp, chaperone overnight, assist with daily camp activities, conduct mock interviews with the juniors, check in campers Friday, take pictures and interview campers for a promotional video, or assist with paperwork prior to camp. If you have a special skill, inspirational story, or ideas to share you are welcome to incorporate them into camp activities.

Mattoon Rotary and Lake Land College Dedicate Two Peace Poles

Nov. 20, the Rotary Club of Mattoon and Lake Land College held a historic ceremony, dedicating two Peace Poles on the Lake Land campus and the first public proclamation of Lake Land's Land Acknowledgment.

The two Peace Poles include the inscription "May Peace Prevail on Earth" in 19 different languages spoken by past and present Lake Land students as well as the indigenous tribes who first inhabited the region. The Land

Acknowledgment honors the tribes and demonstrates the College's commitment to supporting indigenous populations.

Lake Land College President and Mattoon Rotarian Dr. Josh Bullock read the Land Acknowledgment during the event. Rotary District 6490 Governor and Mattoon Rotarian Mike Martin, and Mattoon Rotary Club President Noah Olson, shared

Rotary's mission, vision, and actions for peace, as well as the inspiration for the Peace Poles.

Tanatswa Mutamira, a Lake Land College international student from Zimbabwe, read an original poem about her journey and her experiences as a student in America.

As a service organization since 1921, Mattoon Rotary has continuously engaged in activities to build peace for locally and around the world. The club gained recognition as a Peacebuilder Club by the Rotary Action Group for Peace in August 2022. As a Peacebuilder Club striving to bring more focus to conversations that foster understanding within and across cultures, the club identified a Peace Pole project as an opportunity to create a dedicated space

for such conversations. They chose Lake Land College as the location for the project to support and engage with students from local communities, communities across the country, and around the world.

What a wonderful opportunity for learning, fostering understanding across cultures, and introducing students to the service of Rotary both locally and in their home communities and countries.


