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Clubs Approved for 2024-2025 District Grants

Thank you to each Rotarian and club for making *The Magic of Rotary* a reality in your community and around the world through District Grants.

Arcola – Community Development – \$2,000 – The club will create a city dog park, offering physical and social benefits for both dogs and their owners while developing a sense of community and connection for dog owners. Rotarians will also complete a day of cleanup service in the parks. The club, its foundation, and the city will contribute significant funds for fencing to increase the impact of the grant. Signage and media will promote Rotary.

Arthur – Health – \$2,000 – Rotarians will assist at-risk single mothers and their children by cleaning, painting, and refurbishing rooms at a local shelter that supports unwed, expecting mothers and women in domestic violence situations. The club will match grant funds to purchase paint, furnishings, and supplies for the rooms they sponsor at this apartment. A Rotary plaque will be installed, and local media will cover the project.

Bloomington – Health - \$2,000 – The club plans a partnership with the Central Illinois Special Hockey Association to provide safe helmets and equipment for children with |intellectual and developmental disabilities. They will cheer on the athletes at a special hockey practice and hold a celebration for Rotarians and athletes afterwards. The club is matching grant funds for the new equipment. Rotary stickers will be placed on the helmets.

Bloomington-Normal Daybreak – Community Development – \$1,122 – Rotarians plan to do various building repairs and construct raised garden beds for Dreams are Possible, a small nonprofit training center that provides classes and workshops for economically marginalized women. The building dates from 1910, so many repairs will be needed over several workdays. Signage at the busy intersection and media articles will highlight this Rotary project. **Bloomington-Normal Sunrise** – Community Development - \$1,770 – A local healthcare facility provides medical and dental services to those who cannot afford it and also provides free produce from their community garden for anyone who visits the clinic. This club plans to provide seeds, plants, trees, and shrubs for the garden. They will work to plant and maintain the space. Local press and media will provide coverage and photo opportunities.

Bloomington-Normal Sunset – Community Development – \$2,000 – Up to 100 local residents live on the streets because they do not qualify for shelters. This club will partner with Home Sweet Home Ministries to provide tents, flashlights, blankets, and hygiene supplies to this population. Rotarians will procure and deliver supplies to the ministry organization and assist with distribution to street residents as allowed. The club is matching grant funds.

Bloomington Pub Club – Health – \$2,000 – Senior citizens living on a fixed income find it hard to afford incontinence products that are necessary for their personal hygiene and well-being. This club is partnering with a local "paper pantry" to supply these items for clients. Club members will obtain these items and volunteer at distribution events. Fundraising events will be held to supplement grant funds, and social media will promote the project.

Champaign – Education/Water – \$2,000 – As part of an International Service Trip with other Rotary districts, club members will travel to Mexico to repair/replace up to 200 desktops in schools in the impoverished Guadalajara area. They will also install water filters in four schools to provide clean water for the students and allow them to take clean water home for their families. Club donations will provide 10 more filters for private homes. **Charleston** – Environment - \$1,400 – The club will support environmental sustainability by recruiting the collection of over 420 pounds of plastic caps and lids, which a recycling company will turn into two durable, maintenance-free benches for a local state park. The deep-blue benches with Rotary logos will provide a resting spot for visitors in a scenic area of the park. Rotarians will collect, clean, sort, and transport the plastic.

CU @ the Rotary Satellite – Health – \$1,970 – The new satellite club will work with underserved girls to create clothing and other items that convey messages of positive self-image and confidence. Rotarians will work with the youth about messaging and help them create shirts and other materials with sublimation printers. Local media will cover the project, and Rotary-branded labels will be installed on durable production equipment.

CU Sunrise – Health - \$2,000 – A local home-visiting program serves at-risk families with young children. This club will purchase doorknob and outlet covers, baby gates, smoke detectors, and a variety of other safety items to be assembled into a kit for needy families. Rotary labels will be placed in the front of "Safety around the Home" books in each kit. A club member will donate additional funds for kit supplies.

Danville – Health - \$1,970 – Children who are grieving due to the sickness or loss of a parent can receive comfort by receiving a basket consisting of books, crayons, inspirational books, a stuffed animal, and packet of glitter. This club is partnering with "Light the Way," an organization created by a girl who suffered the loss of her father from cancer when she was 4, by creating and distributing 40 baskets to grieving children.

Grants Cont.

Effingham Sunrise – Community Development - \$2,000 – The community's crisis nursery serve around 150 children annually by providing help for children needing emergency care. This club plans to match grant funds to purchase toys and equipment for the nursery's playground, trim trees and finish the deck to provide a safer environment. A table and Rotary bench are included in the project. Feature stories will be run in the media.

Fairbury – Community

Development- \$2,000 – The rural village of Cropsey is working to rejuvenate the community, with a large project being the creation of Cropsey Area Memorial Park. With the recent installation of playground equipment and plans for sports courts in the park, this club will be providing picnic tables, assembling them, and placing them in a soon-to-be-built park shelter. Local media will provide coverage.

Hoopeston – Community

Development - \$2,000 – The town's public library has been an important part of the lives of many generations of readers. To encourage a love of libraries and reading for teens and preteens, the club plans to update the library's Youth Room by painting, redecorating, supplying new furniture, and providing new puzzles and games. A Rotary plaque and media will announce the project.

Mahomet – Health – \$1,970 WRAPPs (Washable Reusable Accessible Protection for girls during menstruation Promoting equal education opportunities) are in constant demand to allow young women to still attend school during their menstrual cycles. The club is partnering with a local organization to learn how to sew WRAPP kits, which will be distributed to a local pantry and to locations in Africa. Media and newsletters will provide coverage and newsletters will provide coverage.

Marshall – Education - \$1,970 – Some junior high students are unable to participate in gym class and extracurricular sports due to lack of proper clothing and gym shoes. This club is working to launder and supply the school's "Cubs Closet" with these new items for needy students so that they can discreetly be empowered and confident in these physical pursuits. A 4-Way Test and other Rotary info will be posted in the closet.

Mattoon – Community Development -\$1,970 – The club will cultivate flowers and vegetables in the local Bill Duey Sensory Garden that will provide sensory-aid plants for community members, especially those with disabilities, as well as a free food source. The multi-stage project will include garden prepping, planting, construction, and mounting of a peace pole. A Rotary plaque and media coverage are planned.

Metamora-Germantown Hills – Education - \$1,970 This project provides instructional support for 29 elementary students with significant disabilities through the Woodford County Special Education Association. Grant funds will go toward task boxes, adaptive musical instruments and sensory items. Rotarians will purchase and deliver supplies and serve as volunteers and mentors in the classrooms. WCSEA will provide project updates on their Facebook page.

Monticello – Community Development - \$1,923 This club will construct and improve fencing for the Hope Lives Youth Ranch, home of therapy horses that work with children with anxiety, depression, and other social/behavioral issues. The club is matching grant funds to provide the lumber, fencing, and other necessary supplies. They will wear their Rotary T-shirts during the project for social media photo ops.

Normal – Education – \$2,000 – Following COVID-19, there are still students who struggle socially. This club will partner with an expert in social emotional learning for a school program (IM4U) that uses music to create an environment of connection, growth, and discovery, while fostering a sense of unity, compassion, and friendship. Rotarians will supervise the assembly, volunteer monthly, and distribute 4-Way Test bookmarks.

Paris – Community Development -\$2,000 A local park is used by kids whose siblings play team baseball nearby. This club will replace an existing deteriorating swing with a safe, new, handicap-accessible model. Rotarians will assemble the new equipment and spread mulch around the new play set. Matching funds and donations will increase the grant's impact. The park is identified as a Rotary project with signage.

Rantoul – Community Development -\$2,000 Rantoul is very proud of its history as host to the nowdecommissioned Chanute Air Force Base, once one of the largest Air Force training facilities in the world. The club plans to create and install a storyboard at The Missile, one of the few artifacts remaining, to explain the base's history and significance. The village is matching funds, and the sign will credit the Rotary club's sponsorship.

Tuscola – Education - \$2,000 The local school is always looking for activities for students to do at recess and P.E. This club plans to provide tools and labor to install two Gaga Ball pits, which foster competition, teamwork, and activity in an enclosed space that is easy to supervise. The club and school district are matching grant funds. Rotary signage will be attached to the structure, and media will cover the "Rotarians at Work."

Urbana – Peace - \$1,515 Building on the relationship that this Peace Club already has with Solidarity Gardens, which grows and provides produce to the needy, Rotarians plan to buy, paint, and install peace poles in four or five Solidarity Garden sites. Funds will also purchase seeds, plants, and supplies to support the garden program. The Urbana Park District is offering additional funding. Social media and District articles will share info about the project.

Rotary Foundation Honors 2023-2024



The Rotary Foundation recognized clubs in our district with recognition banners, certificates, and congratulatory letters for their 2023-2024 giving. At our recent District Conference, District Rotary Foundation Chair PDG Connie Walsh presented the clubs with their awards.

One of only 1,530 clubs to achieve Top Three Highest Per Capita Annual Giving honors in our district and receiving banners include: No, 1 Urbana (\$509.13); No. 2 Bloomington -Normal Sunset (\$302.14); and No. 3 Champaign West (\$276.75).

For clubs that achieved a minimum Annual Fund contribution of \$100 per capita during the Rotary year with every dues-paying member contributing at least \$25 to the Annual Fund, they received Every Rotarian, Every Year Club banners. These include **Monticello, Paris, and Tuscola**. One of only 3,800 clubs worldwide attain this status.

For clubs that achieved an average of \$100 in per capita giving and 100-percent participation, with every dues-paying member contributing at least \$25 to any Rotary Foundation gift designation during the Rotary year, they received 100% Foundation Giving Club banners. These clubs include **Monticello, Paris, Tuscola, and Vandalia**. One of only 4,500 clubs worldwide becomes a 100% Foundation Giving Club.

Clubs that contributed at least \$1,500 to Rotary's polio eradication efforts received an End Polio Now: Countdown to History Campaign Certificate of Appreciation. Ten clubs received certificates including Arcola, Bloomington, Bloomington-Normal Sunrise, Champaign, Decatur, Effingham-Sunrise, Monticello, Normal, Paris, and Vandalia.

Congratulations and thank you, everyone, for your generosity to The Rotary Foundation during 2023-2024. Let's keep the momentum moving forward during 2024-2025!

Villa Grove – Community Development -\$1,950 The Rotarians of the Villa Grove club have plans to scrape and repaint picnic tables and a pavilion, paint an outdoor lavatory, assemble and paint additional new tables to make local Harrison Park more usable for local families and restore pride in the park. Grant funds will be used for paint, tables, and signage. Local newspapers can provide media coverage.

Basket Auction for PolioPlus Raises Record Funds
