Promoting Peace

"What the "heck" is going on in our world?" Someone asked that question during the Zone Summit in Huntsville. If you have similar questions, you have likely also asked yourself, "What can I do to help create a brighter future? What can Rotarians do?"

More than 20 years ago, Rotary began training professionals to become facilitators for peacebuilding and conflict resolution. Now, Rotary Peace Centers, located at top universities around the globe, have trained nearly 1,800 peace fellows who work to facilitate peace and conflict resolution in more than 140 countries. The newest center, located at Bahçeşehir University in Istanbul, Türkiye, will welcome its first class in early 2025.

The Rotary Action Group for Peace (RAGFP) serves as a resource to the Rotary community and "is on a mission to engage, educate and empower the Rotary network to advance peacebuilding worldwide." A *Together for Peace* webinar series, workshops, *Activate Positive Peace* workbook, and the *Peace Primer* are a few examples of their work. The RAGFP Peacebuilder Club (PBC) program is an essential participant in Rotary International's Peace Area of Focus. PBCs engage in positive peace projects and initiatives within their local communities and collaborate with other PBCs globally. I encourage you to visit Rotary Action Groups for Peace: https://

February is Peace and Conflict Prevention/ Resolution Month for Rotary. February is also significant for Rotary because it includes the anniversary of the first Rotary meeting, held February 23, 1905, in Chicago. This day is now known as World Understanding and Peace Day. During February, Rotarians around the world celebrate their commitment to peace and conflict prevention.

Every day, not just in February, Rotary works to create environments where peace can happen. We create environments of peace through projects in our clubs and communities that address underlying causes of conflict including poverty, discrimination, ethnic tension, lack of access to education, and unequal distribution of resources.



Currently, the Decatur club is supporting two single-parent families who fled Ukraine by sponsoring them to relocate to Decatur. Rotary is helping the parents find employment, learn English, and obtain public education for their children.

Urbana and Decatur Rotary clubs have installed peace poles throughout their communities to recognize their commitment to facilitating peace. The peace poles display the message "May Peace Prevail on Earth" in multiple languages.

Mattoon Rotary will dedicate its first peace pole, established through collaboration with the departments of International Studies and Diversity, Equity, Inclusion and Belonging at Lake Land College, at Lake Land on Wednesday, Nov. 20. Please join us for the celebration!

She was Club President in 2017-2018, Club Foundation President in 2010-2011, and named Rotarian of the Year for 2010-2011. She is a graduate of the Rotary Leadership Institute. Connie is a member of the Paul Harris Society, and she and her husband, Pat, are Major Donors to The Rotary Foundation.

At the district level, Connie served as District Governor in 2022-2023 and is currently serving as District Rotary Foundation Chair for 2024-2027.

In addition, she has served in a variety of roles including Assistant Governor for two years, Area President's Council, Foundation Fundraising Committee Chair, Visioning Committee (including directing the Visioning Process for the Champaign Rotary Club), Foundation Dinner Chair, and District Insurance Representative. Connie helped plan the Presidents-Nominee training for the 2020-2021 Land of Lincoln (LOL) Presidents-Elect Training Seminar (PETS) program and served on the LOL PETS Executive Committee in 2021-2022. Connie attended the Zones 30 & 31 Zone Institute in 2021-2024 and Rotary International Conventions in Atlanta (2017), Houston (2022), and Melbourne (2023).

Connie was born and raised in Decatur, Ill., where she graduated from Lakeview High School. She served in the U.S. Army as a Military Police Officer and after training at Fort McClellan, Ala., was stationed in Germany. Connie has a Bachelor of Arts from Eastern Illinois University, a Master of Public Administration degree from Governors State University and earned a Doctor of Public Administration degree in 2009 from the University of Illinois at Springfield.

Her dissertation research focuses on discretion in the administration of federal policies and expands workforce development research. An in-depth examination of the organizational structural design of programs and workforce development implementation strategies in Illinois was conducted.

Connie served in several areas during her 33 years at the University of Illinois in Urbana-Champaign including human resources, data programming and analysis, and business and financial services. Connie retired in December 2018 as the Chief Financial Officer for the Consortium of Academic and Research Libraries in Illinois (CARLI).

Connie enjoys volunteering in the Champaign area including serving on the Board of Directors for the Developmental Services Center (DSC), where she has served as Board Chair, Treasurer and Secretary. She was event co-chair for a large annual fundraiser for DSC for several years.

The Constitution of Rotary International provides that the COL meet every three years at a site determined by the RI Board of Directors.

The legislation was proposed to the 2025 COL by clubs, districts, the general council or conference of Rotary International in Great Britain and Ireland, and the RI Board.

The legislation is sent to the governor of each district and all members of the Council in English by September 30, 2024.

RICHARD "BIG RICH" CHURCHMAN



Since his induction into Rotary on February 1, 1994, Big Rich has demonstrated unwavering commitment and maintained perfect attendance. His leadership roles include serving as District Governor in 06-07 and DRFC as a Future-Vision Pilot District. He currently serves as District 6200 Foundation Stewardship Subcommittee Chair, chair of the Ole Man River Multi-District PETS, and immediate past chair of the Multi-District PETS Alliance.

At the Zone level, Big Rich's service is extensive and diverse. He has held roles such as ARRFC, EPNZC, RRFC, and lead Zone Trainer/Facilitator for GETS, GNTS, and Institute. His international experience includes serving as an Assistant Chief Sergeant at Arms for several International Conventions and as an International Assembly Training Leader for two years. Currently, he serves as a 20-26 TRF Cadre member in the Disease Prevention & Treatment and the Water & Sanitation Areas of Focus, delegate to the 2025 COL, as an Assistant Rotary Coordinator, Zone 31 Calgary Promotions chair and as the CADRE technical officer on the Operational and WASH RAG boards.

He has received RI's "Avenues of Service" Citation, the RI's "Service Above Self" award, The Rotary Foundation's "Citation for Meritorious Service" and The Rotary Foundation's "Distinguished Service Award." He and his wife Amy are both charter members of RI's Bequest Society, Benefactors, and Major Donors and charter members of the District 6200 Paul Harris Society and PolioPlus Society.

Richard belongs to several Rotary Fellowships and Rotary Action Groups. He has been active in dozens of Short-Term Mission Trips to countries such as Honduras, Nicaragua, Mexico, El Salvador, Kenya, and Tanzania.

Larry Lunsford serves as a Trustee of The Rotary Foundation for a four-year term 2021-2025. After serving as Vice-Chair for the 2022-23 Rotary year, as Executive Committee Chair for the 2023-24 Rotary year, the Trustees elected Larry to serve as Vice Chair for this 2024-25 Rotary year.

Larry's passion for Rotary and his invitation into the family of Rotary began during his college years when he was sponsored by the Rotary Club of Macon, Missouri and selected as a Rotary Foundation Ambassadorial Scholar to Newcastle, New South Wales, Australia in 1982.

Larry joined the Rotary Club of Kansas City-Plaza, Missouri in 1991. He served as his club's President in 1997-98, served as District Governor of District 6040 (Missouri) in 2001-02, and served as Rotary International Director in 2013-15.

As District Governor, Larry helped lead the "Missouri Rotarians for New York" statewide service project that raised over \$100,000 in 2001 for those affected by the events of 9/11. For the past 23 years, Larry has served as the Shoes Cheerleader for his District resulting in efforts which have collected nearly 440,000 pairs of new shoes through the Shoes for Orphan Souls project in partnership with Buckner International. The Shoes project has taken him to Russia, Guatemala and the Dominican Republic to deliver new shoes to orphan children in those countries. Larry served as Chair for his District's Rotary Foundation Centennial Legacy Dinner in 2017 which raised \$3.3 million for our Foundation in outright gifts and commitments.
