

SCHOOL PROGRAMS

JA Ourselves uses compelling stories read aloud by the volunteer, along with handson activities, to demonstrate helping, working, earning, and saving.

JA Our Families emphasizes the roles people play in the local economy and engages students with activities about needs, wants, jobs, tools and skills, and interdependence.

JA Our Community explores the interdependent roles of workers in a community, the work they perform, and how communities work.

JA Our City studies careers, the skills people need to work in specific careers, and how businesses contribute to a city

JA Our Region introduces the relationship between the natural, human, and capital resources found in different regions and explores regional businesses that produce goods and services for consumers.

JA Our Nation introduces students to business operations and economic issues in the United States.

JA More than Money teaches students about earning, spending, sharing and saving money, and businesses they can start or jobs they can perform to earn money.

CAPSTONE PROGRAMS

IA BizTown

Elementary school students are not old enough to drive, work, vote, or be the boss. But that doesn't stop them from operating banks, managing restaurants, writing checks, and voting for mayor at JA BizTown!



JA Finance Park helps students build a foundation for making intelligent, lifelong personal financial decisions through hands-on, realistic site-based experiences. The program includes in-school, teacher-led activities

culminating in a visit to Lincoln Finance Park and a post-visit assessment.



MIDDLE SCHOOL PROGRAMS

JA Global Marketplace provides practical information about the global economy and its effect on students'

JA Economics for Success explores personal finance and

students' education and career options based on their skills, interests, and values. It also

demonstrates the economic benefits of staying in school

JA America Works provides students with examples of how business and entrepreneurship affected the economic development of the United States during the 19th century.

JA It's My Business encourages students to develop four key characteristics of an entrepreneur: Fill A Need, Know Your Customer and Product, Be Creative and Innovative, and Believe In Yourself.

HIGH SCHOOL PROGRAMS

NEFE Financial Planning Program introduces students to the importance of making wise financial decisions. The

program demonstrates the importance of planning, goal setting, and thoughtful decision-making within the context of personal financial decisions. Five required, volunteer-led sessions. Twenty-four additional teacher-led sessions are available.



JA Success Skills helps students identify and demonstrate the workreadiness skills needed to research,

get, and keep a job and to develop innovative personal strategies to achieve lifelong learning pursuits and career opportunities.

JA Titan introduces critical economics and management decisions through an interactive web-based simulation.

JA Job Shadow meets the needs of a diverse group of high school students by providing engaging, academically enriching, and experiential learning sessions in workreadiness education and career perspectives.

JA Economics examines the fundamental concepts of micro-, macro-, and international economics.
