What is RYLA? -2023 ROTARY YOUTH LEADERSHIP AWARDS

RYLA is a Rotary-sponsored youth leadership training program for high school-age students. Each year, more than 9,000 young people are sponsored in RYLA programs by Rotary clubs in over 25 countries. The RYLA program takes full advantage of the beautiful wooded setting. Under the guidance of trained facilitators at Bradford Woods, RYLA participants gain valuable leadership skills through a variety of adventurous "learn by doing" opportunities.

RYLA participants sleep in cabins and spend most of their day in the outdoor setting. Daily activities are a part of the Bradford Woods Outdoor Challenge Education Program. Some of the activities are only inches from the ground while others are a bit more daring. All require the participants to take a risk, give 100% and be a supportive member of a team. All RYLA students grow in self-confidence, gain insights into positive group behaviors and interactions, develop leadership skills, make a lot of new friends, and have a lot of fun in the process.

Since 1988, Rotary and its partners have reduced Polio cases by 99.9% and are on track to make it the second human disease to ever be eradicated. The last mile is always the toughest. As we head into October, let us come together as Rotarians to raise awareness of our polio eradication efforts and to take action for World Polio Day. Some ways to take action are as follows: HOST – organize a community event and invite the media and local officials to participate or create a fundraiser to collect donations for the PolioPlus Fund. WRITE - propose a story about World Polio Day and your club's contributions toward eradicating polio to your local media outlets or send a letter about the importance of ending polio to the features editor at your local media. SHARE - use the sample posts from the World Polio Day Toolkit on your social media pages and follow @EndPolioNow on Facebook and Twitter. Most importantly, do not forget to share how you're observing World Polio Day and register your club's participation at www.endpolio.org. Thank you for all your efforts in your communities and for imagining the possibilities of the change that we can make to transform our clubs and the world.

As World Polio Day approaches, we need your help to amplify our message about eradicating polio to protect the world's children from a devastating disease.

We have made tremendous progress since the Global Polio Eradication Initiative was launched:

- * A 99.9% reduction in cases of illness caused by wild poliovirus
- * 3 billion children immunized
- * 125 countries where polio was endemic reduced to two Afghanistan and Pakistan with the virus contained in just a few districts and provinces

But even just one case still represents one child's life forever changed by polio. That's why Rotary members must remain tenacious and keep our promise: We won't stop until we know that no child will ever again experience the paralyzing effects of polio.

Let's use World Polio Day to advocate for the support we need to make history by eradicating polio. **Together, we**

Districts offer \$40K through All-Indiana Rotary Global Scholarship

The three Indiana Rotary districts are coming together to award \$40,000 to an outstanding graduate student in 2024-25 through the All-Indiana Global Grant Scholarship program.

With the three districts' support, the application process is open to students who have graduated – or will graduate by May 2024 – from a four-year Indiana college (or who maintain a legal residence in the state). Rotary family members aren't eligible.

Applicants must commit to pursuing graduate-level studies at a university outside North America in a program that aligns with one of Rotary's seven areas of focus. See www.rotaryglobalscholar.com for information.

Our 2024-25 All-Indiana Scholar will be an ambassador for Rotary and for the state of Indiana. During the two-plus years, the scholar will give dozens of talks to clubs and districts overseas and in Indiana.

We're funding the \$40,000 global grant scholarship through \$8,000 in DDF (District Designated Funds) from each of the three districts with \$16,000 from The Rotary Foundation's World Fund.

Rotary Club of Dubois County honors Sr. Rose Mary Rexing as 2023 ATHENA Award Recipient

The Rotary Club of Dubois County celebrated its 11th annual ATHENA Leadership Award Banquet on Wednesday, September 13th at the Huntingburg Event Center in Huntingburg, Indiana, where Sr. Rose Mary Rexing, OSB, was named the 2023 Recipient of the ATHENA Leadership Award.

In addition to Sr. Rose Mary, four other ATHENA Award finalists were honored at the event, which celebrates female leaders of Dubois County: Annette Altmeyer, Dana Kunz, Dr. Kristi Nord, and Erin Rauscher.

"We are proud to host this event honoring the female leaders of Dubois County," said Rotary Club of Dubois County ATHENA Event Chair, Manda Combs. "It was an extremely difficult decision for our committee to decide on a recipient this year. Sr. Rose Mary Rexing only agreed to be nominated if all the credit went to God, her family, her community, and the Sisters of St. Benedict. Her fifty years of ministry in following God's call has led her to many different paths of leadership that I think we can all learn from."

Sr. Rose Mary served as a math and chemistry teacher and head of an all-male science department at Forest Park High School. She continued her ministry to youth and "being present to each person in the moment" as a Pastoral Associate at St. Ferdinand Parish. Her next position as Vocations Director involved helping numerous young adult women to discern how God was calling them. This led her to involve her entire community in sharing their vocational endeavors with other religious communities from all over the world. This program caught the eye of both the Wall Street Journal and ABC Nightline. She was awarded the University of Notre Dame Exemplar Award and recognized for her outstanding contribution to vocation ministry by the National Religious Vocations Conference. As Director of Mission Advancement, she led the fundraising efforts to renovate the monastery Church, establishing a special relationship with Florence Henderson and helped start

a women's philanthropy group, Women of the Rule, which funds community projects. As Executive Director of Mission Integration at Memorial Hospital and Health Care Center, she started the Prayer and Presence Program, training volunteers to sit with the sick and dying, and also provided spiritual formation programs for the staff.

In addition to celebrating the five honorees, the 300 event attendees enjoyed a keynote presentation from Lori Sutton, MBA, CDE, CDR. She is the Chief Inclusion, Diversity and Equity Officer of American Water Works.

"Lori did a fantastic job sharing her wisdom on what it means to be your authentic self, which is one of the main attributes of our ATHENA honorees," said Dan Collignon, Rotary Club of Dubois County President. "Her message was one that was a great reminder for attendees of all ages, but especially our young attendees. I believe they'll remember her words of encouragement and wisdom for years to come."

The Rotary Club of Dubois County would like to thank its 2023 ATHENA Awards Platinum Level Sponsors: Dentons Bingham Greenebaum, German American Bank, Kimball International, Memorial Hospital and Health Care Center, and Old National Bank.



Three clubs in our district are currently hosting Rotary Youth Exchange (RYE) students: Washington, Franklin and Bedford. Nearly everyone knows that being an exchange student can open doors to life-changing experiences and relationships that last a lifetime. What is less well-known is that hosting an exchange student is a wonderful experience for a Rotary Club and can give a club a sense of purpose and a greater understanding of the world outside of the local community.

If your club would like to host an international exchange student in academic year 2024-25, now is the time to start organizing and planning. Clubs will need to have a fully-vetted Youth Exchange Officer (YEO) in place before a student

is assigned. Clubs can expect to spend about \$100 a month for the student's stipend, plus school-related expenses. It is also wise to start talking to potential host families long before an inbound student is assigned to your club.

ShelterBox responds to earthquake relief efforts in Morocco -early-stage disaster information

A ShelterBox emergency assessment team is in Marrakesh finding out what support is needed following the earthquake, and if we are well placed to help. The team is assessing the damage as well as speaking with local people, authorities, organizations, and our Rotary network as we try to understand how many people are without adequate shelter.

We are in touch with Rotary in District D9010 and their District Governor. Our deployed team met with a local Rotary today in Marrakesh and with other local organizations that Rotary has helped connect our team with.

In these situations, coordination hubs are set up, so we'll be looking to base ourselves where the response is being coordinated. Often, it's not in the most affected areas but in a nearby town or city. Sharing and gathering information with organizations and people on the ground will help us understand more about what is needed now and in the coming days, weeks, and months.

The earthquake hit just after 11pm local time under the cover of darkness and most people would have been at home asleep. It's the strongest earthquake to be recorded in the region and was felt as far away as Portugal and Algeria. Buildings have been flattened or left unsafe for people to stay in. Homes and schools have been destroyed and people have lost homes and loved ones. There is uncertainty and panic, and people have little choice but to sleep in the open for fear of more powerful aftershocks that could collapse already weakened buildings.



Earthquakes are not common in North Africa, so there are more unknowns than usual. With large distances between mountain villages, access routes blocked with rubble, and communication networks affected, it will take time to fully understand the extent of the damage and shelter needs. We need to look carefully about what a response might look like and how we might get aid to where it is needed most if we do respond. We will look at all options if we decide a response is necessary, including sending tents, shelter kits, cash assistance, or solar lights.

A lot remains unknown at this stage, including humanitarian needs and response - especially shelter gaps, the number

of people displaced, how many buildings are damaged or destroyed, and the needs of affected people. We also need to receive Moroccan government permission to operate in country. Our assessment team is working hard to determine if, how and where we can respond.

The response is in the emergency search and rescue phase with people still trapped beneath the rubble. Powerful aftershocks are hampering rescue efforts, and the death toll is expected to keep rising. After the search and rescue operations comes the recovery effort, which is where organizations like ours come in. Through the search and rescue stage we learn a lot and that's why information sharing and gathering is important. We learn where the worst damage is and what kind of help is needed in those areas.

Although the weather is fair now, affected areas are at higher altitudes and temperatures will dip as winter approaches, which is likely to increase the humanitarian need in the region. Our aid items could be suitable - we use different types of shelter aid depending on the climate that are designed to be used for months not weeks, which is often what's needed.

Those in attendance focused on strengthening their clubs through five breakout sessions. Highlights from those sessions were:

Foundation: Attendees in the Foundation session heard from District Foundation Chair Jessika Hane. She shared some Rotary Foundation Basics and encouraged Rotarians in the room to share their experience when it comes to getting club members excited about giving to the Rotary Foundation. We also learned about the effectiveness of matching points campaigns and discussed how to read and utilize Foundation Giving Reports. Any Club President or Club Foundation Chair who would like to schedule a time to go over this training is welcome to contact Jessika Hane.

Membership: Attendees in the membership track heard about top ideas that have been working with clubs throughout the Midwest. They also received samples of materials they could use and customize to improve both their members and visitors expeirences. Each also received statistics specifically related to their club's membership.

Public Image: Attendees learned ideas for crafting messages for press releases, social media posts, as well as traditional press messages to help with attracting new members and retaining and engaging current members. They learned quick and easy ways to get messages across to the community about Rotary.

Disaster Response: The Assembly offered a wonderful opportunity to share in greater detail the district's ongoing development of a disaster response by providing local club leadership with a potential job description for a Club Disaster Response Chair, an understanding of how agencies work together in response to disasters, along with a step by step process that the club leaders could take back to their local boards and clubs. We are so grateful to committee members Richard Rudolph and David Decker who shared extensively from their positions of experience and training. Please be looking for more information that will be coming soon as the committee follows up on this great time of sharing.

Youth Exchange: In the breakout session on Rotary Youth Exchange, participants discussed their own experiences and their clubs' goals with respect to youth exchange. Session leader Rowena Cross-Najafi presented an overview of the program that included timelines, rules, procedures and the division of responsibilities between the club, district and Central States. In general, participants showed a high level of interest in Rotary Youth Exchange, which is one of Rotary's oldest, most visible and most consequential programs.

The big question for any District 6580 club pondering Rotary Youth Exchange is whether to jump in right now and





For the 24-25 District grant year, approximately \$38,240 is available to be awarded. The amount available is determined by donations made to The Rotary Foundation by members of District 6580 three years prior. Of the amount contributed, around 50% is returned to the district and half of this is available for district grants. The parameters for the grants will be the same as last year, with \$250 minimum and \$3000 maximum. All forms and evaluation criteria will be available at rotary6580.org under the Foundation tab. District grants can be for local or international projects.
