She is the new Riverway Manager for MVCD.

Bill Nance interviewed Monica Snow for the Member Spotlight Monica talked about her passion for Preservation Dayton. She came to Dayton from Michigan and talked about not wanting to move to Ohio. She found herself walking around the Oregon District her first night and 45 years later she is still here in the Oregon District passionately working to preserve the historic buildings and neighborhoods in Dayton. She spoke about the Traxler Mansion and how she and Preservation Dayton are working to preserve the mansion. She also spoke about the Santa Clara Business District and the work they are doing to try and preserve that area. She loves performing arts and not performing which got a lot of laughs. President Kim introduced Guest Speaker Wes Hartshorn. Wes talked about how he got into building things. He helped put an addition on a 1850s farmhouse on social row road that he helped with as a teen. He began to buy abandoned houses in Dayton. He bought 22 abandoned houses that he bought and purchased and rehabbed. Two of them are Airbnb's. During the pandemic he traveled around the Midwest and southern US gong to bars, restaurants and food halls in Memphis, Nashville, Indianapolis, and Detroit. The Detroit Shipping Company was the model. He met with Developer Jon Harzell about 800 E. First Street called the Silos that he put \$600,000 of his own money into and got a \$2.2 million loan for the Silos which will be a single entertainment development near 2nd Street Market. The 1 ½ acres near downtown Dayton saw construction begin on Dec. 4, 2023. It will be a giant food hall with shipping containers. The goal is to have four food vendors with a bar at the location once it opens. He purchased three gazebos from India as well as triple arches made of teak and mango wood that will be on site. He believes he is the first to have imported India Gazebos to the United States. The land had been sitting empty for 35 years and he thought it would be a great spot to create a hub and be a part of the downtown Dayton renaissance. They hope to be open Aug. 21 of this year. They do not have all of the vendors lined up yet. Phase one is the food hall. Phase two is a coffee shop and phase three and four is an event center.
