School is happening now and the club has been generous over the years helping fund purchases of supplies for teachers. *On Friday, Aug 18 from 9-11 a.m. there will be a Stuff the Bus kickoff where volunteers can help make supplies and create kits to help the organization get ready for the start of school and increased needs.* Over the years several members of Rotary including current board member Dave Bowman and past board members Dave Williamson, Cathy Ponitz and Rusty Clifford have helped give back to the organization. Penny Wolff has been a longtime volunteer during the school year greeting and checking in teachers on Mondays. Steve gave a Day 100 in gratitude for the help.

Two Paul Harris fellowships were awarded by Frank Scott. One to Jason Hillard with his fifth Paul Harris Fellowship – representing \$5,000 in donations and the second to Sarah Hippensteel Hall who received her second Paul Harris fellowship. Checks came in over the weekend from monies through the Paul Harris Fellowships back to Dayton and we were awarded District matching grants. The first was for \$2760 for Coats Plus. The second was \$3,000 for Sleep in Heavenly Peace and the third was for \$2,000 for additional equipment for Sleep in Heavenly Peace Montgomery County Chapter. It's a great example of how far donations can go in helping support our community.

Kim then asked Lisa Grigsby, Chair of the Day, and Chair of the Speakers Committee, to introduce the speakers. Lisa shared that one of her goals is to introduce stories and people that we may not know about in the group.

Did you know Dayton's roller derby league is one of the top-ranked teams in the world? Their charter team, Purple Reign, ended the year with a perfect season after winning every game they played. This was our chance to learn all about Roller Derby, how you can join, support or cheer on the team or partner with them for community outreach. Lisa introduced Wishbone Breaker – Head referee and officiant and Danger, Purple Reign skater, Violet Femmes Co-Captain and Bout Production Co-chair who is part of Dayton's Premier Roller Derby League.

Danger and Wishbone took us through the basics of roller derby – the track set-up , the positions, the blocking and how scoring works. For a deep dive on this head to this link to learn more: Roller derby - Wikipedia

The game is played in two 30 minute halves with a break between. Each play is called a "jam session." There are 1,100 teams worldwide and Dayton's team is in the top 40 right now. The sport is broken up into regions and Dayton is ranked 11th in the North America North East. Both Danger and Wishbone emphasized that the sport locally has leagues and gameplay at all levels and for all bodies. In addition to participants, there are skating officials (referees) and non-skating officials, coaches, announcers and other volunteers. In 2023 Roller Derby brought in 6 leagues and 120 people to participate in games. Our local Roller Derby teams are involved in charity promotion and fundraising, community service and community engagements. WFTDA or Women's Flat Track Derby Association (Home - Women's Flat Track Derby Association (WFTDA), is the governing body with six competitive regions: North America West, North America North East, North America South East, Latin America, Europe and Oceania.

Our teams locally are Purple Reign our Ranked A team, Violet Femmes our ranked B team and Lavender Haze. League operations are split into two areas – team management and organization management. Purple Reign is currently sitting at 11th of 125 teams and violet femmes are currently sitting at 93rd


