Club Conducts S.W.O.T. Analysis

The newly formed Membership and Engagement Committee, chaired by Terry Pope, conducted a S.W.O.T. analysis of the club during the regular Monday meeting on September 9th. This activity asked the members in attendance to consider the club's Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Threats.

During this process, both internal and external factors were considered when looking at club meetings, community service projects, fundraisers, and other club activities. Additional feedback was provided the following week during the club assembly. A member satisfaction survey has also been conducted. The information from all of these activities will be used in the planning process for club improvements.

The committee members, Derrick Fetz, Samantha Winner, Isabel Martin, Nick Selvaggio, Charles Thiel, Karen Bailey, and Terry Pope, will be using the feedback from this activity along with the responses to a recently completed member satisfaction survey to consider ways to increase club membership and improve the engagement of current members.

ABCs of Rotary: Rotary's Wheel Emblem

A wheel has been the symbol of Rotary since our earliest days. The first design was made by Chicago Rotarian Montague Bear, an engraver who drew a simple wagon wheel, with a few lines to show



dust and motion. The wheel was said to illustrate "Civilization and Movement." Most of the early clubs had some form of wagon wheel on their publications and letterheads. Finally, in 1922, it was decided that all Rotary clubs should adopt a single design as the exclusive emblem of Rotarians.

Thus, in 1923, the present gear wheel with 24 cogs and six spokes was adopted by the Rotary International Association. A group of engineers advised that the gear wheel was mechanically unsound and would not work without a "keyway" in the center of the gear to attach it to a power shaft. So, in 1923, the keyway was added, and the design which we now know was formally adopted as the official Rotary International emblem. Club Fundraisers A \$uccess!

The annual fundraisers for the Rotary Club of Urbana, Ohio – the July 4th Chicken BBQ and the Dairy Bar at the Champaign County Fair – were both very successful this year.



With the difficulty of securing a pyrotechnics provider for fireworks on Independence Day, the club determined the best option was to move the fireworks to a weekend date and maintain the traditional Chicken BBQ on July 4th. As a result of reducing the number of chickens cooked to a single session, the available meals sold out right after 5:30pm. The Chicken BBQ and Saturday fireworks concessions raised just over \$4,000 in profit for the club.

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The milkshakes, ice cream cones, and Swiss cheese on rye sandwiches were, once again, all big hits at the Champaign County Fair this year. Beginning on August 2nd through the 9th, many club members, family members, scholarship recipients, and friends of the Club manned the Dairy Bar from 11am to 11pm each day.

A combination of warm, humid weather, and just a little rain, allowed the strawberry and vanilla ice cream to sell out on the last day of the fair.

An approximate total of \$19,000 was raised by the club for the week. As usual, Bill Borland completed the majority of the organization needed for a successful year.

In the battle of the donation jars, \$186.63 was given for scholarships and \$113.05 was donated for fireworks.
